ProsperUs is a Collective Impact partnership comprised of non-profit, government, healthcare, education, labour, business, and inspired community members including parents and youth. We have a shared vision of a prosperous Windsor-Essex County where all children and youth have the support they need to succeed from cradle to career. You can learn more about our work at <u>weunlockpotential.com</u>.

Our Cradle to Career approach is a proven strategy that focuses on systems change to ensure young people have wrap-around supports from the time they are born until they enter the workforce. This work is focused on priority neighbourhoods where data tell us families face the greatest barriers: Downtown Windsor, West Windsor, and Leamington.

In May 2022, ProsperUs formed a resident-led Advocacy Working Group for West Windsor and Downtown Windsor. Advocacy Working Group members identified that access to healthcare services is a significant barrier they regularly face. Our research demonstrates a need to focus on increasing access to primary healthcare services:

- According to the Primary Care Data Reports for Ontario Health Teams (2022), 32,118 people in Windsor-Essex County are not attached to a Primary Care Provider. This includes 6,998 children between the ages of 0-14.ⁱ
- Among people not currently attached to a Primary Care Provider in our region, 45% live in neighbourhoods with the lowest average incomes.ⁱⁱ
- The need for physician recruitment is growing as Windsor-Essex County has an aging Physician population. More than 1 in 5 physicians in Windsor-Essex County were over the age of 65 and approaching retirement in 2019.^{III}
- According to the Windsor Essex Ontario Health Team's Comprehensive Primary Care Report (2022), Physicians over the age of 65 in Windsor have a total of 28,986 patients. In Learnington, Physicians over the age of 65 have a total of 4992 patients.
- Furthermore, there are only 31 pediatricians^{iv} currently working in our region serving a population of 36,640 children ages 0-14.^v
- The pressure on our healthcare system was reflected in 2022, when Windsor Regional Hospital had the longest Emergency Room wait times in Ontario as too many people used hospitals for primary care.^{vi}

This is important because in Ontario, people living with low incomes are more likely to experience health risks in their daily life such as having less access to nutritious food. They are also more likely to live with multiple chronic conditions which can lead to further health problems, yet they are less likely to receive quality healthcare.^{vii} For

example, children living in low-income households are more likely to experience health issues such as asthma and obesity and face barriers to accessing preventive and primary care services.^{viii}

As of January 2023, the Regional Physician Recruiter Office Windsor/Essex (RPROWE) is no longer funded by any municipality in Windsor-Essex County. RPROWE supported all hospitals, community clinics, agencies, and private offices in our region, as well as the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Ontario. This initiative recruited an average of 34 physicians annually and recruited 569 physicians between 2003 and 2019.^{ix} 1 in 6 physicians required help with immigration which this initiative provided.^x

The ProsperUs partnership, including resident members of the ProsperUs Advocacy Working Group, recommends that the City of Windsor collaborate with other municipalities and healthcare leaders in Windsor-Essex County to establish a strategy for physician recruitment and retention in our region. This strategy could include:

- Conducting a comprehensive review of the unmet healthcare needs of residents in Windsor-Essex County and how municipalities can collaborate with local healthcare leaders and the Government of Ontario to increase our region's capacity to meet the needs of residents.
- 2) Reconvening the Regional Physician Recruitment Steering Committee to increase data sharing, collaboration, and strategic action among healthcare providers. This could include informing and implementing a comprehensive strategy for physician recruitment and retention and working with the <u>Canadian Society of Physician Recruitment</u> to ensure more local residents have access to a Primary Care Provider.
- 3) Increasing investment in physician recruitment and retention efforts for local healthcare services based on the needs of residents, including specializations and languages spoken.
- 4) Coordinating regional advocacy efforts to the Government of Ontario regarding increased access to Primary Care Providers, including increased funding for local healthcare services and expanding the number of residency spaces at schools of medicine.

Delayed access to healthcare services has life-long consequences and increases costs to the healthcare system.^{xi} Increasing early prevention, and easing the pressure on healthcare workers and services requires the involvement of all levels of government. ProsperUs is presenting this letter to the City of Windsor and the County of Essex to raise awareness of the need for increased regional dialogue on access to primary care providers.



Through continued advocacy, as well as endorsement of a regional strategy for physician recruitment and retention, we believe that municipalities in Windsor-Essex County can make a significant impact on this key issue.

Dear Warden and Council:

It is my understanding that a letter from the Advocacy Working Group of the region's ProsperUs organization is on your agenda, or will be soon. That letter, regarding the need to address the alarming shortage of primary care providers in this area, has also been shared with me and other officials at the College. I am writing to you to endorse the argument made by ProsperUs: namely, that this lack of general practitioners is something of a crisis and that it warrants a comprehensive effort - including the involvement of municipal governments - to retain the family physicians that we currently have and to recruit a substantial number of new ones to practice in our area.

Over its half-century of existence, St. Clair has certainly proved capable of supplying the region's health-care system with most of the support personnel that it requires. We've staffed local hospitals, clinics and doctors' offices with our graduates from Nursing, Practical Nursing, Personal Support Worker, Dental Hygiene and Assisting, Pharmacy Technician, Medical Laboratory Science and Technician, Respiratory Therapy, Diagnostic Medical and Cardiac Sonography, Cardiovascular Technology, Paramedic, Advanced Medical Esthetics Practitioner, and Occupational Therapist Assistant/Physiotherapist Assistant. What we have not been able to do, of course, is to provide physicians to the area.

Even the launch of the University of Windsor-based Schulich Medical School in 2012 hasn't been able to fully furnish all of the family doctors needed by our citizens. About 100 of its graduates over the years have remained in Windsor-Essex - and that's wonderful - but it still hasn't been sufficient to provide primary care service to all who need it.

The situation, also, is being exacerbated by a trend that St. Clair has also observed (and been attempting to address) in the skilled trades: namely, that a great many current family physicians are now of retirement age and will be departing from their practices within the next few years. Not being able to readily find a plumber or electrician when you need one is inconvenient, but not being able to obtain access to a doctor is potentially life-threatening.

It's been said – accurately, I think – that the quality of a society is best judged by how well (or poorly) its weakest members are cared for: children, the elderly, and the financially disadvantaged. The ProsperUs study reveals that it is the well-being of precisely those demographic groups that are most at-risk due to this shortage of primary care providers. In this instance, our society, our community, is failing its weakest members.

I'm confident that this current situation can be resolved. A renewal of funding of recruitment programs and the enhancement of strategies to address this physician shortage are essential. And I think the many recommendations of the ProsperUs Advocacy Working Group should be adopted and enacted by all of the governments, organizations and agencies which might have a role to play in rectifying this crisis. I and St. Clair College are certainly on-board to provide any assistance that we can.

Good afternoon Mary,

We thank you for reaching out to the office of MPP Trevor Jones and sharing the County of Essex's inquiries about food and organic waste reduction and diversion in Ontario.

With over one third of Ontario's waste stream made up of organic waste, including food waste and scraps, it is critical that we continue to explore ways to recover value from a resource as important as food waste.

We recognize the importance of diverting waste from landfill in order to extend landfill life, support innovation and job growth in new environmental sectors that convert wastes into valuable resources.

That is why we have the <u>Food and Organic Waste Policy Statement</u> (the Policy Statement) in place, which directs municipalities, businesses, and institutions to reduce and divert food and organic waste as well as promoting the rescue of surplus food.

The Policy Statement sets targets for medium to large municipalities, and larger businesses and institutions to reduce and divert 50 to 70 per cent of their food and organic waste by 2023-2025.

For the industrial, commercial and institutional (IC&I) sector specifically, the Policy Statement includes the following targets:

- Industrial and commercial facilities that generate 300 kg per week or more of food and organic waste have targets ranging from 50 to 70 per cent waste reduction and resource recovery of food and organic waste generated in the facility by 2025.
- Educational institutions and hospitals that generate 150 kilograms or more of food and organic waste per week have a target of 70 per cent waste reduction and resource recovery of food and organic waste generated in the facility by 2025.

Although these targets do not apply to greenhouses, which are categorized as crop producers, the ministry remains open to identifying opportunities to support new and emerging technologies, as well as innovative solutions that support our goal of reducing the amount of waste sent to landfill for final disposal. For example, the ministry amended Regulation 101/07 – Waste Management Projects, under the *Environmental Assessment Act*, to streamline the environmental assessment (EA) requirements for thermal treatment sites that undertake advanced recycling. The amendments set

out when thermal treatment sites engaging in advanced recycling are exempt from EA requirements, are conditionally exempt provided an Environmental Screening Process is completed, and those that must undertake an Individual Environmental Assessment. These changes encourage the recovery of valuable resources from waste.

Additionally, in 2021, the Ontario government made amendments to Regulation 267/03 – General, under the *Nutrient Management Act*, to create more opportunities for agricultural producers to treat both on- and off-farm organic materials in on-farm anaerobic digesters. The expected outcomes of these regulatory changes include:

- Increased opportunities for management of food and organic waste in the circular food economy;
- Increased production of renewable natural gas in Ontario; and
- Increased economic development opportunities for the agri-food sector.

Regarding the Province's commitment to develop and communicate a strategy for the implementation of a landfill food and organic waste ban by 2030; the pandemic has impacted all sectors, especially Ontario's businesses and institutions. We need more time for Ontario's businesses, hospitals and schools to recover before we consider moving forward with disposal bans as a way of reducing and diverting waste. As a result, the government will not be moving forward with a landfill ban on food waste at this time.

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, Ontario invested over \$5 million through the Surplus Food Redistribution Infrastructure Program to help keep good food out of landfills. More information can be found on this and other resource recovery initiatives in the <u>Progress Report on the Strategy for a</u> <u>Waste-Free Ontario: Building the Circular Economy</u>.

We are working on guidance to help Ontarians reduce their food waste as well as helping municipalities, businesses and institutions meet their targets and other obligations under the Policy Statement.

We know that being able to divert and recover value from waste requires the cooperation of all Ontarians, as well as the government, and we recognize and applaud the efforts that many municipalities and businesses continue to take to reduce the amount of food and organic waste.

We thank you for your interest in reducing and recovering value from food and organic waste in Ontario and hope you have found this information helpful.

At a recent Kingsville Town Council meeting, a motion was passed to approve the town staff engaging in a community needs assessment for the Cottam branch, which is expected to include consultations with Essex County Library. The results of this needs assessment will provide directions regarding a new facility for the branch.

In early August, the Learnington branch experienced significant flooding resulting in damage to several ranges of shelving. Learnington municipal staff believe they have isolated and addressed the root cause of this flooding.

Essex County Library invited library users, of all ages, to track their reading progress as part of the "Read for Your Municipality" contest. To date, participants have logged over 972,000 pages with LaSalle branch taking the lead.

B) Hours of Operation Update

Split Branch Model

Back in the fall of 2022, the split branch model was implemented. This model includes 1 full-time employee assigned to 2 small branches and splitting their day between the two. Administration has had time to make note of successes and challenges for this model and we have established 3 major concerns:

- 1. Given these employees are splitting their days between two branches, they are required to travel from one branch to another. This causes concern from a health & safety perspective.
- 2. Traveling between two branches every day has resulted in high mileage costs for the organization.
- 3. The hours of operation for the small branches are not consistent throughout the week which is causing confusion for patrons.

The Hours of Operation update report proposes a more appropriate model that can maintain the split model but allow the branches to have more consistent hours of operation, which will be presented to the Board at a later date.

Open+

The Open+ model of service was introduced in early 2021 as a means of increasing service hours for smaller branches, without increasing costs for staffing. The Library has not received positive feedback from the participating communities, however reports indicate that the service is being utilized. The data being used for this report is solely from the Harrow and McGregor branches. It is intended that the Comber branch will be implementing Open+, however there have been delays in the installation process.

The Board is requesting that Administration provide annual costing information, as it relates to Open+, at the September meeting.

Harrow Branch Hours

Historically, the Harrow branch was considered a medium-sized branch, with 35 hours of service weekly. Post-COVID, and with the implementation of Open+ service, those hours were reduced to 15.5 hours per week.

We have noticed a 126% increase in circulation at the Harrow branch, which results in the circulation rate comparing closely to that of the larger branches in which are staffed with 4 employees, full-time and part-time, as opposed to 1 full-time employee at Harrow.

It has been determined that Harrow needs at least 15 additional staffed hours to increase service levels to their pre-COVID 35 hours per week. Additional staffing would provide the necessary support. The Hours of Operation report proposes the creation of a new full-time Resource Assistant position, pending 2024 budget approval.

Purpose

The purpose of this report is to provide Council with an update on the Corporation's utilization of commodity price hedging and recommend continued participation with the Association of Municipalities of Ontario / Local Authority Services Ltd (AMO/LAS) Procurement Programs, to procure, in bulk, electricity and natural gas in the open market on behalf of partnering municipalities.

Background

In accordance with the Municipal Act, 2001, regulation 653/05, and the County of Essex Commodity Price Hedging Policy (Policy 06-11), the Treasurer is required to report annually on all commodity price hedging agreements in place. The goal of the commodity price hedging policy is to allow the Treasurer to enter into fixed price agreements for the future delivery of all or any portion of a commodity when deemed advantageous to do so.

The County continues to utilize the services of AMO/LAS Procurement Programs. As part of the strategy, a hedging contract is used to minimize potential risk of spot market fluctuations.

A hedge is a financial agreement that fixes the price to be paid by the municipality for future delivery of a commodity. A hedge is typically used to reduce cost fluctuations and provide cost certainty. The County's current agreement with LAS includes a hedge of 50% of its total electricity requirements. This hedging level has been in place since the last report to County Council in October of 2022. The hedge is applicable to all electricity purchased by the Corporation with the exception of street light usage which is kept on the spot market. Because street light energy demand typically occurs during off-peak/lower cost times, the benefit of hedging is low.

For natural gas, LAS purchases incremental gas contracts at various points each year with a goal of building a total hedge portfolio of 80-90% of program requirements for the current year, with the remaining consumption settling at prevailing market rates.

Discussion

Electricity

The Corporation's electricity bills consist of a number of cost components:

- Energy Charge (based on actual usage and set by retailer)
- Global Adjustment Charge (set by province)
- Delivery Charge (set by regulation)
- Regulatory Charges (set by regulation)

The only component of the bill that is eligible for hedging is the energy charge. All other components of the bill are regulated and ineligible for hedge protection.

Appendix A illustrates the hedging results for the Corporation for the period January 1, 2022 to December 31, 2022. Overall, the hedge program returned net savings of approximately \$3,171 over time of use (TOU) rates when combining the Corporation's hedged and streetlight accounts.

Natural Gas

The hedging program for natural gas includes a rebate feature that returns program savings back to participating municipalities. In 2022, the Corporation received a rebate payment in the amount of \$5,262 for the savings earned in 2021.

In terms of the components of the natural gas bill that are eligible for hedging, the program offers pricing stability for the commodity charge well as the deregulated transportation charges. All other components of the natural gas bill are regulated and ineligible for hedging. The program is designed to provide rate stability rather than guarantee rate savings.

The LAS Natural Gas Program offers a favorable price for its members, considering the volatility of the natural gas market. The program provides protection against unpredictable market conditions and is expected to support gradually rising prices in the second half of 2023. The program has also secured all of its transportation obligations. Lastly, it is important to note that the carbon tax on natural gas has increased as of April 1, 2023.

Administration will continue to monitor the benefit of rate stability compared to lower spot market prices.

Financial Implications

The goal of participating in the LAS hedging programs is to ensure stable commodity rates to assist in annual budgeting. The high level of regulation in the commodity markets does admittedly have a limiting effect on any hedging program.

Rebates received from the natural gas program are recorded in miscellaneous revenue as they are received. The Corporation's Budget reflects the anticipated costs of hydro and natural gas based on the hedge prices obtained through participation in LAS Commodity programs.



Purpose

To recommend to Council the addition of one staff position, as included in the 2023 Budget. The recommended department/position is as follows:

• Financial Services / IT – Project Coordinator/Manager

Background

Corporate Policy 91-001, Employment/Hiring, provides the process for considering and approving new positions to be added to the existing staffing complement. Section 6.0 of the Employment/Hiring Policy requires:

- The request to be presented to the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO) for review. Such presentation is to include the Department Head's written business case for adding the position;
- The CAO is to present a recommendation to County Council for approval;
- Once the position is approved by Council, the hiring manager and Director, Human Resources shall establish the appropriate recruitment strategy.

At the December 7, 2022 Budget meeting of County Council, the overall budget for General Government Services was approved which included funding for the addition of the above noted position.

On January 18, 2023, the Interim CAO, Mary Birch identified that the proposed staffing addition in the IT department would be presented to County Council upon the completion of the department's service delivery

review which was to take place during the year. Blackline Consulting was awarded the contract and has substantially completed the review of the IT department.

As required in the Employment/Hiring Policy, business cases for any new positions are to be prepared by the department head and submitted to the CAO. Due to the recent transition of the Director of Financial Services / Treasurer into the CAO role, the CAO has assumed the responsibility for the development of this business case and presentation to County Council.

Discussion

The IT Division provides critical technological infrastructure and service supports to all County departments as well as to our seven local municipal partners. The following table illustrates the increase in demand for IT services over the last three years.

Projects	Increase – 78% from 18 to 82

The IT Division currently consists of 8 positions:

- 1. Manager of IT
- 2. Network Administrator
- 3. Network Support Analyst
- 4. IT Technicians (4)
- 5. GIS Technician

Staffing levels have not changed since 2017 despite exponential increases in the demand for IT services.

The service delivery review included a jurisdictional scan of IT departments of other similarly sized municipalities. The scan revealed a complement of approximately 13 staff is typically required to manage the IT demands of a municipality of our size. Included in that average staff group was dedicated project management resources.

The service delivery review recommends a reorganization of the department to better meet the needs of the Corporation. A more fulsome report on the recommended reorganization phases will be presented to Council in conjunction with the 2024 Budget. The first phase of the recommended reorganization includes the addition of a project management resource.

Technology permeates all aspects of our service delivery and projects have grown in both size and complexity. A Project Coordinator/Manager would improve the visibility of IT expertise, the timeliness of IT response and coordination among departments. At present, due to the volume of IT related projects and lack of sufficient IT staff, consultation and implementation are routinely delayed. In some cases, the delays are impeding the efficient delivery of County services and presenting a barrier to service improvement.

Financial Implications

The 2023 Budget included funding for a staff addition in the IT department assuming a July 1st hire date. It is expected that recruitment for a Project Coordinator/Manager would be complete by mid-November, realizing budget savings in 2023. The annualized cost of the new position would be included in the 2024 Budget.
