Delegation # 2 Page 1 of 2

Mayor Hurst, Members of Council, thank you for hearing my concerns.

As you are well aware, the decision by the city of Windsor has serious consequences for early years education in our community. Many of the issues that were brought up to Windsor Council have not, I feel, been adequately addressed. These are that the statements about child care choices are misleading, that provinicial stabilization funding has still not been determined one way or another, Also, the financial impact on privately run centres with regard to the implementaion of full-day kindergarten has yet to be adequately determined. Many of these centres may not be able to cope with loss of these profitable spots, and may close their doors in coming years.

Moreover, I must voice my concerns to the fact that while the Town of Tecumseh has been vocal both about the decision to close the centres and about that it intends to study possible solutions, little has been from the Town of Amherstburg.

It is to this end that I mostly wish to speak tonight.

I urge this council to work fully with the County of Essex and the Town of Tecumseh to see if there are any feasible arrangements to maintain the operation of these centres. There are so many factors at work at the current time, I feel it simply deserves full study before abandoning the municipally-delivered model.

We should study the feasibility of offering services at a municipally-run centre that offers services such as infant and extended hours that are not offered by private centres. One need only look at Windsor's Jefferson Child Care Centre to see the evidence for need.

Are there any cost-sharing arrangements that could be possible with other county-delivered services? A while ago, much was made about the shortage of room at the Amherstburg library – is there a possibility that Children's library services could co-exist at a child care centre?

Again, it is worrisome that little study was done to establish the impact that this decision will have on the privately operated daycares. They will suffer financially,

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possibly leading to significant instability in the child care provider industry. Without a municipal center to provide stability, the county and the town of Amherstburg will have little control over these effects. The Town should ensure that the County of Essex retains ownership of the building at 236 Cherrylawn, even if it elects to lease it to a non-profit operator.

In closing, a final point. Mayor Hurst spoke at the last County Council meeting with concerns about the aging local population and the need to keep these people in their own homes longer. I make no argument with this position. However, with an aging population the Town of Amherstburg should also be striving to provide services that make the town desirable to young families. I agree that seniors are an important part of our community and deserve our concern and support, but historically it is young families that provide the growth in tax base that municipalities need to provide expanded services.

Delegation February 8, 2010

Neil Stewart

I would like to request a streetlight be placed at the river end of Alma Street between the two park benches. This would serve two purposes to illuminate the cul-de-sac and also the Parkette that has been created at the river. With it being so poorly lit over the years it has been a source of illegal activity. If this is done it will help make it safer for all residents of the area by helping to keep the undesirable element away. This matter was discussed with Mr. Zarlenga and Mr. Rick Spencer shortly after reconstruction of Alma Street began.

I last appeared before Council on November 23, 2009 regarding the sewage backup pumps. Under questioning by Mayor Hurst, Mr. Zarlenga stated that the pumps should be delivered and installed by the middle of December a job that would take one day. They were finally installed on February 4, 2010 and ran for one day before shutting down due to electrical problems. I have heard from three different sources (first December 23rd, second February 3 and the third time on the 5th February) that the pumps are the wrong kind and only temporary. I would like Council to ask Mr. Zarlenga the following questions:

1. Why did it take more than seven weeks to complete a one day job?

- 2. Why did the pumps only work for one day before they malfunctioned?
- 3. Are these pumps the correct pumps or not?
- 4. After all the much publicized sewage problems in this area, why did it take from February 6 to February 8 to respond to the emergency flashing light on top of the control panel?
- 5. Is there not supposed to be a direct emergency signal from the control panel to the Ontario Clean Water Agency who are contracted to service and maintain these pumps?

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- 6. Why wasn't all the electrical and preparation work done prior to the delivery of the pumps instead of after?
- 7. Why were we led to believe that these pumps were just an auxiliary backup prevention just in case the Sewage Treatment Plant shut down due to a hydro blackout when in fact they are just an industrial sump pump that runs intermittently 24/7, 365 days per year depending on how much sewage and water is discharged from the home?
- 8. Why are 42 and 46 Alma Street the only homes in Amherstburg to have this system in front of their homes? Why are they both different? One has a small basin and pipe to deflect the raw sewage down to the bottom of the catch basin the other does not.
- 9. If as Mr. Zarlenga suggested the problem with the sewers at the corner of Alma and Laird has been corrected; Why do we need this system at all? We have lived at this location since 1977 (32 years) and never had a problem before the separation of sanitary and storm sewers.

On February 5 the day after the pumps were finally installed I paid the bill for the Port-a-John. It was supposed to be picked up this morning but after what has transpired over the weekend I called and cancelled the pickup. We are getting quite attached to it after three months. The Port-a-John will stay until we get some satisfactory answers to our questions and concerns.
