1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

- 1. The report from the Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer dated January 11, 2018 regarding By-law 2018-08 Temporary Borrowing **BE RECEIVED**;
- By-law 2018-08 being a by-law to provide for the temporary borrowing of an upset limit of seven million dollars in funds for the Town of Amherstburg BE APPROVED in accordance with Section 407 of the Municipal Act; and,
- 3. **By-law 2018-08** being a by-law to provide for the temporary borrowing of an upset limit of seven million dollars in funds for the Town of Amherstburg be taken as having been read three times and finally passed and the Mayor and Clerk **BE AUTHORIZED** to sign same.

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

The Municipal Act allows for the Temporary borrowing of funds for municipal operations. Section 407 of the Act states the following:

Borrowing for expenses

407. (1) At any time during a fiscal year, a municipality may authorize temporary borrowing, until the taxes are collected and other revenues are received, of the amounts that the municipality considers necessary to meet the expenses of the municipality for

the year and of the amounts, whether or not they are expenses for the year, that the municipality requires in the year for,

(a) reserve, sinking and retirement funds;

- (b) principal and interest due on any debt of the municipality;
- (c) school purposes;
- (d) other purposes the municipality is required by law to provide for; and
- (e) the amount of principal and interest payable by a person or municipality primarily liable for a debt, if the municipality has guaranteed the debt and the debt is in default. 2001, c. 25, s. 407 (1); 2009, c. 18, Sched. 18, s. 6 (1).

On January 9, 2017, Town Council passed a Temporary Borrowing By-law 2017-02 for the municipal operations of 2017.

The adoption of a Temporary Borrowing By-law is standard practice for the Town and is a vehicle which provides the Town authorization to temporarily borrow funds for municipal purposes. This exercise is done annually to ensure accountability, transparency and to support the temporary borrowing needs of the Town.

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

To ensure that the Town operates in accordance with the Municipal Act, administration has prepared the annual Temporary Borrowing By-law for Council's consideration and adoption. By-law 2018-08 provides Council an update on the current amount of temporary funds authorized for the Town's line of credit. By-law 2018-08 further rescinds By-law 2017-02.

4. <u>RISK ANALYSIS:</u>

Financial Institutions lending monies to municipalities require Temporary Borrowing Bylaws to be updated annually to ensure that Administration has the authority to borrow temporary funds. A failure to do so may delay the Towns ability to access funds required for municipal operations and may place the Town in non-compliance of the operating line of credit agreement.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

The Town of Amherstburg currently has an approved borrowing limit of Seven Million dollars from WFCU for the Town's operating line of credit. It is important to note that this approval **does not seek an increase** from past years requirements.

6. <u>CONSULTATIONS</u>:

There were no consultations on this report.

7. <u>CONCLUSION</u>:

That Council approve By-law 2018-08 as required to allow for prudent financial administration of the Town as per the Municipal Act.

BY-LAW NO. 2018-08

By-law to provide for temporary borrowing until the taxes are collected and other revenues are received.

WHEREAS Section 317 (1, 2, 3, 4) of **The Municipal Act 2001**, Chapter 25, provides that the Council of a local municipality to provide for temporary borrowing, until the taxes are collected and other revenues are received, of the amount council considers necessary to meet the current expenditures of the municipality for one year;

WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg deems it necessary to borrow the sum of Seven Million Dollars to meet the current expenditures of the Corporation for the year 2018.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED AS A BY LAW OF THE SAID CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF AMHERSTBURG AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. The Head of Council and Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer are hereby authorized to borrow from The Town's Financial Institution from time to time by way of promissory note or bankers' acceptance a sum or sums not exceeding at any one time, Seven Million Dollars to meet the current expenditures of the Corporation for the year 2018.
- 2. The Head of Council and Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer are hereby authorized to sign on behalf of the Corporation and to furnish to the said Bank from time to time promissory notes or bankers' acceptances for the sum or sums so borrowed with interest or any other charges at such rate as the Bank may from time to time determine.
- 3. The Head of Council and Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer are hereby authorized and directed to furnish to the said Bank as it may from time to time request a statement showing the nature and amount of the estimated revenues of the current year not yet collected or of the estimates adopted for the next preceding year and also showing the total of any amounts borrowed in the current year and in any preceding year that have not been repaid.
- 4. All sums borrowed from the said Bank and any interest thereon and any other charges in connection therewith shall be a charge upon the whole of the revenues of the Corporation for the current year and for any preceding years as and when such revenues are received and that the Head of Council and Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer are hereby authorized to sign on behalf of the Corporation and to furnish to the Bank an Agreement or Agreements of the Corporation, in the form annexed hereto charging the said revenues of the Corporation with payment of all sums borrowed from the Bank and any interest thereon and any other charges in connection therewith.
- 5. The Head of Council and Director of Corporate Services/Treasurer are hereby authorized and directed to apply in payment of all sums borrowed from the said Bank and any interest thereon and any other charges in connection therewith, of all of the money's hereafter collected or received on account or realized in respect of the taxes levied for the current year and for any preceding years and of all of the moneys collected or received from any other source.

- 6. By-law 2017-02 is hereby repealed effective January 1, 2018.
- 7. This By-law shall come into force and effect on January 1, 2018.

1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

- 1. The report from the Manager of Engineering dated December 20, 2017, regarding the Engineering Services Southeast Quadrant Servicing Class Environmental Assessment **BE RECEIVED**;
- An agreement with Stantec Consulting Ltd. to provide Engineering Services to complete the Southeast Quadrant Servicing Class Environmental Assessment BE AUTHORIZED in the amount of \$225,000 (excluding H.S.T.);
- 3. The Director of Corporate Services **BE DIRECTED** to **PRE-COMMIT \$225,000** in the 2018 Wastewater budget; and,
- 4. **By-law 2018-04** being a by-law to enter into an agreement with Stantec Consulting Ltd. to provide engineering services required to complete the Southeast Quadrant Servicing Class Environmental Assessment be taken as having been read three times and finally passed and the Mayor and Clerk **BE AUTHORIZED** to sign same.

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

As part of the Town's initiative to provide the required infrastructure to allow for development of the Southeast Quadrant (generally the lands surrounding the Fryer

Street / Lowes Sideroad intersection) the Town must complete a Class Environmental Assessment (EA).

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

The Town currently has a very limited number of buildable lots within the settlement area identified by the province. The Southeast Quadrant lands offer one of the larger areas that can be developed for residential use. This area has a number of different land owners and due to this fact the Town is working to provide a servicing strategy that will provide the necessary infrastructure for all of the developable lands in this area.

In February 2017, the Town entered into an agreement with Stantec Consulting to complete a preliminary sanitary and water servicing study for the southeast quadrant lands. This agreement was authorized by the CAO based on procurement policy FINAN-PR-POL-01.

This study generally included reviewing existing Town infrastructure along with the proposed developments in the area to determine a number of potential servicing strategies. These different strategies were then reviewed and a preferred solution was selected. Preliminary design was then undertaken including probable costing for the servicing. Stantec was chosen to complete this servicing study as a number of other local engineering firms were already involved representing the developers in the area. Stantec had no connection to any of the developers in the area and has an extensive background in completing projects of this nature locally.

The Town received the draft study, including proposed costing, and reviewed the results with the potential developers. We have received confirmation from 3 of the 5 developers that they want the project to proceed. Administration is working with the 4th developer to address some of their concerns while the 5th landowner has requested to be excluded from the servicing.

Although final draft plans and designs have not been completed for these developable properties Stantec used conceptual designs and typical housing densities to determine approximate number of residential units per development. With the three confirmed developers there is a potential for 1277 residential units with an additional 500 with the 4th developer.

Administration requested that Stantec provide a proposal to complete the Class EA for this project based on the number of engineers already involved in other capacities and Stantec's previous background with the project. It should be noted that the \$225,000 is the upset limit for the project and that the work will be billed on an hourly basis based on work performed.

It should be noted that Section 24 of the Town's procurement policy FINAN-PR-POL-01 allows for the CAO to grant an exemption to the procurement and purchasing procedures.

Specifically, within Section 24 of the procurement policy, there is a provision with respect to Consulting or Professional Services that allows for the CAO to waive the requirement to use a sealed bid process for Consulting or Professional Services. This project meets the criteria of item a. and partially items b. & c listed below.

24.3.8. Consulting and Professional Services

24.3.8.1. If it has been deemed necessary to obtain a firm to provide consulting and/or professional services, the CAO may waive the requirement to use a sealed bid process for the acquisition of these services and may approve a consultant or professional services for a particular project without competitive process where one or more of the following conditions exist:

- a. The works are a continuation of a previous project
- b. The firm has demonstrated unique qualifications to undertake the project including in-house experience or historical data of the Municipality
- c. Time constraints restrict the ability to seek proposals or quotations that would result in increased costs or loss of provincial or federal funding

It is Administration's position that Stantec is best suited and equipped to complete the Class EA quickly and efficiently, moving the entire project forward as expediently as possible. The developers are anxious to move this project forward as quickly as possible to take advantage of the current housing market as well as capitalize on the positive forward movement the Town is making, positioning ourselves as the a residential destination of choice.

4. <u>RISK ANALYSIS:</u>

Not awarding the Class EA to Stantec would delay the project by a significant amount of time. Timing to move forward with this project is critical due to the current housing market and developer demand. The Town is working on a number of initiatives to make Amherstburg a residential destination of choice in the region and having available building lots is a key component for this.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

It is proposed that the Class EA portion of the project be funded through the 2018 Wastewater capital budget. The 2019 general tax capital, water and wastewater budgets will include portions of this project as it moves from Class EA and engineering design stage to the construction phase.

The Town will be recovering a portion of the costs (including interest) for the design and construction of the infrastructure required to service this area for development. All of the sanitary sewer and watermain costs will be recoverable. There are a number of different ways the Town can recover these costs such as lump sum payment, yearly repayment or an area specific DC for example. Administration will work directly with the developers

to determine which methods of repayment best suit all parties. These repayment agreements will be brought to Council for approval. Preliminary estimates that were completed for the original servicing study place the cost of this work at \$9,011,000. These estimates carry a level of accuracy of +30% to -15%.

A portion of the roadwork (including storm sewers) would need to be funded through general tax and development charges. This work would include the full reconstruction of Fryer Street from Pickering to Lowes and the full reconstruction of Lowes Sideroad from Sandwich Street to Meloche Road. Preliminary estimates that were completed for the original servicing study place the cost of this work at \$8,062,000. This estimate is based on converting these roads to an urban cross-section including curbs and storm sewers. These projects have been outlined in the development charge study of 2014.

From a potential revenue perspective the estimated 1,777 homes would generate an estimated \$22,644,311 in development fees (using the 2018 development charge fee of \$12,743 for single family and semi-detached dwellings)

From an ongoing municipal tax perspective assuming an average home price of \$250,000 for the full build out of 1,777 homes, would generate approximately \$4,100,000 in annual municipal revenue based on the 2018 mill rate. This revenue would remain in perpetuity on a yearly basis.

WHEREAS the Corporation is desirous that certain services should be provided for the implementation of:

The Consultant herby covenants and agrees to provide all and every kind of labour and materials for, and to undertake and complete in strict accordance with his Proposal dated the:

And the Consultant Documents are annexed hereto and form part of this Agreement to the same extent as fully embodied herein, the provision of the above noted works for the sum of:

Two Hundred and Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$225,000.00) excluding H.S.T.

The estimated total cost of the effort to deliver the scope described above, excluding applicable taxes. Invoices will be billed based on the actual effort expended, with monthly invoicing on a time and materials basis for services rendered plus reimbursable expenses, not to exceed the upset limit without the Town's prior approval of a budget increase due to a change in scope of work.

The Consultant further covenants and agrees to undertake and complete the said work in a customarily accepted professional standard under the supervision and direction and to the reasonable satisfaction of the Town of Amherstburg Engineering and Public Works Department acting reasonably within the specified time in his Quotation.

The Consultant further covenants and agrees that he will at all times, indemnify and save harmless, the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg along with their respective officers and servants, from and against all loss and damages which may be made or brought against the above listed to the proportionate extent caused by the negligent acts, omissions or willful misconduct of the Consultant, its servants, agents or employees.

In the event that the Consultant fails to commence correction of any non-performance or negligent performance of this Agreement within five (5) days of receiving written notice thereof, the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg may terminate this Agreement forthwith.

Either party may terminate this Agreement without cause on sixty (60) days written notice to the other.

The liability of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg shall be limited to payment for all authorized work performed to the termination date, less the reasonable costs of correcting or performing the said work. Neither party shall in any event, be liable to the other for any consequential damages or other costs related to the termination of this Agreement.

The Consultant is not responsible for damages or delays in performance caused by acts of God, strikes, lockouts, accidents or other events beyond the control of the Consultant. In any such event, the Consultant's contract price and schedule shall be equitably adjusted.

The Consultant covenants that throughout the Term, it shall take out and keep in full force and effect, or cause to be taken out and kept in full force and effect at the Consultant's cost:

(a)Commercial General Liability insurance in respect of the Lands and the Works contained therein against claims for personal injury, death, property damage or loss, indemnifying and protecting the Requestor and the Town to the inclusive limit of not less than Five Million Dollars (\$5,000,000.00). A Certificate of Insurance indicating the required coverage and additional insured requirements will be delivered to the Town prior to the commencement of the Works.

Such policies shall not be terminated, cancelled or materially altered unless written notice of such termination, cancellation or material alteration is given by the insurers to the Town at least thirty (30) business days before the effective date thereof.

The Corporation hereby covenants and agrees that if the said Work is duly and properly executed and materials are provided as aforesaid, and if the said Consultant carries out, performs and observes all of the requirements and conditions of this Agreement, the Corporation will pay to the Consultant, the price set forth in his Quotation, such payment or

payments to be made in accordance with the provisions of the General Conditions of the Contract to above.

This Agreement and everything herein contained shall enure to the benefit of and be binding upon the parties hereto, their heirs, executors, administrators, successors and assigns, respectively.

We are pleased to submit our proposal for engineering services for the above referenced project.

UNDERSTANDING OF ASSIGNMENT

The intent of this project is to carry out a Class Environmental Assessment to provide both sewage and water supply infrastructure to service new developments within the areas making up the Town of Amherstburg's (Town) southeast quadrant as presented in Figure 1.

The scope of this assignment is to consist of the following:

Prepare a Municipal Class Environmental Assessment (Class EA) to service the Town's Southeast Quadrant with sewage and water supply infrastructure in accordance with the requirements of the Ontario Environmental Assessment Act and Municipal Engineers Association Municipal Class Environmental Assessment Process (MEACEAP).

Our proposal has been prepared on the assumption that the Class EA is carried out as a Schedule "B" activity with the completion of Phase's 1 & 2 of the Class EA process.

It is our understanding that the above Class EA is to be completed in a timely fashion to facilitate the development and servicing of vacant lands within the southeast quadrant under Phase V and beyond both in the near and long term.

To achieve this objective, Stantec is to commence work on the Class EA immediately following the execution of a Professional Services Agreement. It is anticipated that the Class EA can be completed by September of 2018 assuming reasonable and timely input and review comments from all stakeholders as well as no Part II Order requests. The key factor for timely completion of this Class EA is anticipated to be weather related conditions which will dictate when several field assessments including surveys, studies, etc. can be undertaken and completed.

SCOPE OF SERVICES & WORK PLAN

The following scope of services and work plan is proposed for this assignment.

1. Project Setup

1. Project initiation meeting with Town including:

- a. Confirmation on scope of work and adjust as required;
- b. Discussion of project schedule;
- c. Preparation of meeting minutes.
- 2. Preparation of project implementation plan (PIP) and review detailed scope of services with Town.



2. Phase 1 of MEACEA Process

Phase 1 of the Class EA process involves the development, evaluation and establishment of the problem statement(s) including:

- 1. Review existing reports/studies and data collection;
- 2. Identify review agencies/stakeholders (railways, regulatory agencies, businesses, First Nations, property owners, etc.);
- 3. Prepare Notice of Commencement and advertise. The Town will be responsible for all advertisements of the notice in any fashion such as mailings, newspapers, websites, etc. including all fees and expenses associated with the advertisements.
- 4. Define Problem/Opportunity.

3. Phase 2 of the MEACEA Process

Phase 2 of the Class EA process involves identifying and evaluating alternative solutions to address the problem statement(s) and evaluating and establishing the preferred solution(s) including:

- 1. Identifying alternative solutions to the problem;
 - a. Default "Do Nothing" alternative;
 - b. Sewage Consideration of two (2) alternatives for sewage servicing plans of the Study Area;
 - c. Water Consideration of two (2) alternatives for water servicing plans of the Study Area;
- 2. Environmental Inventory review;
 - Existing/Future Land Use in concert with the Town's Planning Department, Stantec to review Official Plan Zoning By-laws, development applications, etc., to establish existing and future land uses within study area;
 - b. Natural Environment;
 - i. Terrestrial Habitat (vegetation and wildlife):
 - Collect and review available background information for study area including data obtained via consultation with Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF), Essex Region Conservation Authority (ERCA), and Town of Amherstburg. Data to also be compiled from a variety of secondary sources, including Land Information Ontario (LIO) database, Natural Heritage Information Centre (NHIC) database, Species at Risk Ontario List and various wildlife atlases.
 - Conduct field investigations consisting of single season visits to document presence/absence of species at risk and provincially rare plant species, and also conduct habitat assessments using standard protocols such as Ecological Land Classification and the Significant Wildlife Habitat Technical Guide and supporting EcoRegion Criteria Schedules.
 - Prepare standalone technical memorandum to summarize existing conditions and evaluation of relative sensitivities and significance. Memorandum to compile natural heritage data on georeferenced plans in GIS environment including sensitive and significant features. Provide recommendations on mitigating impacts to species at risk or other sensitive environmental features while identifying regulatory requirements. Potential regulatory requirements may include mitigation or authorization requirements under the Endangered Species Act, Migratory Birds Convention Act, or ERCA regulation.



ii. Fisheries Habitat/Aquatic Resources;

Based on a preliminary review of Essex Region Conservation Authority mapping and the 2005 Fish Habitat Management Plan (ERCA), there is only one (1) currently identified fish habitat area within the study area; that being Big Creek. There are municipal drains located within the ERCA Regulation Limit as follows:

- Norbury Drain, running westerly and northerly adjacent to the Amherst Quarries lands
- Second Concession Road Drain, running parallel to the east side of Fryer Street
- Second Concession Road Drain South, running southeasterly through the study area from Fryer Street to Big Creek
- Lebert Drain, running parallel to the west side of Second Concession South

The work plan associated with Big Creek and these drains currently includes:

- Review of background information for these drain features to determine if any fish habitat issues have previously been identified
- Contact with ERCA staff to discuss any concerns related to these drain features
- Documentation of any background information/issues in the EA report
- Provision of recommendations for mitigation related to construction of the preferred alternative

Should consultations with ERCA identify concerns related to Big Creek or drain features and ERCA recommends that a fisheries inventory is to be completed, then this work would be considered extra and not included in our proposal and Stantec can provide a quotation to complete such an assessment at that time.

- iii. Contamination Overview Study (COS);
 - The COS is to be comprised of a modified Phase 1 Environmental Site Assessment (ESA). This is to include a review of publicly available historical records pertaining to potential environmental concerns, completion of a site visit (which includes a windshield survey to verify information gathered in the review of historical records), and the preparation of a report to document the findings. The study is to deviate from a Phase 1 ESA as outlined in CSA Z768-01 in that it will not include building assessments or individual walk-throughs of any property, fire insurance plans will not be ordered, and city directories will not be assessed. Additionally, interviews with individual landowners will not be completed as part of the site reconnaissance; however, available Town personnel familiar with the study area may be interviewed as part of the Environment and Climate Change (MOECC) for information they have on file for the properties within the study area. Stantec will rely on obtaining this information by requesting a database search of the COS study area from Ecolog Environmental Risk Information Services (ERIS).
 - Stantec is to subcontract and engage ERIS to search a variety of databases containing information relevant to the assessment of potential environmental concerns. It is assumed that one ERIS report will be obtained encompassing the study area presented in Figure 1. Further, Stantec is to review in-house historical aerial photographs, in-house fire insurance plans (if available), online aerial imagery (e.g., Google Earth™), Google Street View™, and available previously completed environmental site assessment reports for the work construction areas as part of the historical review. In addition, an allowance has been provided for the purchase of



approximately two (2) historical aerial photographs, if required, from the National Air Photo Library.

- The site visit is to be a windshield survey and therefore both the subject site and the adjoining properties are to be viewed from publicly accessible roadways that in some cases may not be safe to step on. Therefore, due to obstructions of view or access restrictions imposed by working on or near an operational roadway, the presence of some potentially contaminating land uses might not be confirmed or determined within certain locations during the site visit. The site visit assessment is to be limited to areas visible from accessible locations.
- Services are to include COS described above to identify and document actual and potential sources of contamination within or adjacent to the study limits. At this time, no provision has been made for the inclusion of any scope of work for an excess materials management plan (EMMP), Phase I or II Environmental Site Assessments (ESAs), or a designated substance survey (DSS). Recommendations on the need for these additional assessments can be provided to the Town following completion of the COS, some of which, could potentially be combined with geotechnical investigations required for construction of the works.
- c. Social Environment;
 - i. The access needs of residents and emergency services are to be assessed.
 - ii. Noise Assessment

Stantec to undertake a noise assessment for the recommended solution based on MOECC's Environmental Guide for Noise document (NPC-300) to determine the need for noise attenuation measures. A noise report is to be prepared detailing the results of the analysis and conceptual details of recommended mitigation measures (if any).

The following steps are to be undertaken:

- Data Collection and Review Review of available data including existing receptors, planned sources of noise onsite, and zoning of adjacent lands, and operating scenario. Acoustical assessments are to be based on preliminary drawings developed as part of the Class EA.
- Modelling The potential acoustical effect at the receptors are to be established through a modelling approach approved by MOECC. The assessment would establish criteria for current and future conditions and noise control requirements determined and compliance established.
- Mitigation Design If the acoustic impact were to exceeds the permissible limit at receptors, then the acoustical team are to discuss potential mitigation measures and their feasibility.
- Noise Assessment Report A noise assessment report is to be prepared, detailing the analysis, modelling and results of the acoustic assessment. This report is to detail the mitigation measures required, its design, and its technical feasibility.
- iii. Air Assessment

Due to the nature of the subject works, we have assumed that a full air quality assessment will not be required and not included in our proposal as the expected air quality impacts are anticipated to be minor. However, Stantec will provide recommendations in the Class EA report for localized mitigation measures to be implemented to minimize any potential



impacts on ambient air quality from pumping stations, forcemain air-release chambers, and construction emissions.

iv. Aesthetics

Stantec is to provide commentary on building materials to be used in the construction of any sewage pumping station(s) with regards to conformance with local development standards and proposed developments in vicinity of said stations.

- d. Cultural Environment:
 - i. Archeological Assessment

The objective of the Stage 1 archaeological assessment will be to gather information about the study area's geography, history, current land conditions and any previous archaeological research within the vicinity. This assessment will provide a description and detailed evaluation of all features of archaeological potential noted for the project. The Stage 1 archaeological assessment is to be completed according to specifications of the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport's (MTCS) 2011 Standards and Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists (Government of Ontario 2011) and is to include the following tasks:

- Review of relevant archaeological, historic and environmental literature pertaining to the project and study area;
- Review of an updated listing of archaeological sites from the MTCS's Archaeological Sites Database; and
- Review of historic maps of the study area.

The Stage 1 archaeological assessment will be used to determine the archaeological potential of the area proposed to be impacted by construction. The Stage 1 assessment will also identify any areas within the study area that have been subject to extensive and deep land alterations (disturbances) that have eradicated any potential for the identification and documentation of archaeological resources.

The information gathered during the Stage 1 archaeological assessment is then be used to recommend further archaeological work, as applicable, in the form of a Stage 2 archaeological assessment. From a preliminary review of the study area and readily available data, it is our opinion that a Stage 2 archaeological assessment will be necessary. Hence, an allowance has been included in our proposal to carry out a Stage 2 archaeological assessment.

The Stage 2 archaeological assessment is to consist of a physical survey of the study area using a mix of survey methodology based on terrain, including test pit survey method at five and ten meter intervals (where applicable), as well as pedestrian survey at five meter intervals. It will be important that the proponent arranges to have all agricultural lands and any accessible lands ploughed in advance of the archaeological assessment. The MTCS standards require that all agricultural and accessible land be recently ploughed and sufficiently weathered to improve the visibility of archaeological resources. For any areas which are inaccessible for ploughing, or linear corridors that are 10 meters wide or less within agricultural fields, the physical survey of the study area is to consist of the test pit survey method at a five-meter intervals. For areas within municipal right-of-way's adjacent to urban developments, the physical survey is to consist of the test pit survey method at



ten-meter intervals to confirm modern disturbance. If modern disturbances are not observed, the survey will move to five meter intervals.

Areas of significant disturbance such as existing buildings and laneways, or areas of previous earth-moving activities and disturbance will not require an assessment but will be photo documented in accordance with MTCS stipulations. Moreover, areas that are deemed to be steeply sloped (e.g. greater than 200) will also not require an assessment but will be photo documented in accordance with MTCS stipulations.

The resultant report is to provide recommendations as to whether additional Stage 3 archaeological assessment is required. A Stage 3 archaeological assessment falls outside of the present scope of work and has not included in our proposal.

Should a Stage 3 archaeological assessment be required, Stantec can provide a proposal and price to carry out the assessment to the Town at that time.

ii. Heritage

A Cultural Heritage Assessment Report (CHAR) is to be undertaken to identify and evaluate potential built and cultural heritage landscape resources within the Study Area.

The CHAR is to include an inventory of previously identified protected properties within the Study Area (if any) and an inventory of potential heritage resources over 40 years of age, including both built heritage resources and cultural heritage landscapes, to satisfy the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (MTCS) Criteria for Evaluating Potential for Built Heritage Resources and Cultural Heritage Landscapes checklist.

Municipal planning staff are to be consulted to determine the presence of protected or previously identified heritage resources in the study area (if any). Provincial agencies including the Ontario Heritage Trust and MTCS are to be consulted to determine the presence of any additional protected properties within the study area.

A background history of the study area is to be prepared and supplemented by a site visit where a windshield survey is to be completed to identify potential heritage resources using the nationally accepted 40-year threshold for identification. Following this, each potential heritage resource is to be assessed according to Ontario Regulation 9/06 to determine cultural heritage value or interest. Where impacts may be anticipated, the CHAR is to identify recommendations for mitigation strategies to avoid or reduce adverse impacts on cultural heritage resources. Recommendations are to be made to avoid or mitigate those impacts based on the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport's InfoSheet #5: Heritage Impact Assessments and Conservation Plans from the Heritage Resources in the Land Use Planning Process Cultural Heritage and Archaeology Policies of the Ontario Provincial Policy Statement, 2005, as required.

e. Economic Environment

Any economic impact that results from this project is to be examined and considered part of the overall assessment, including any changes in land use as well as costs of construction of the improvements, property costs and maintenance costs.

f. First Nations

Through communications with various First Nations indigenous groups, Stantec to inventory all lands, treaty rights and land claims within the study area.

While not a requirement during Stage 1 and Stage 2 archaeological assessments, the MTCS recommends beginning Aboriginal engagement early on in the assessment process as it has



been Stantec's archaeological team's experience that early engagement with First Nations is beneficial. Stantec recommends integrating the process of Aboriginal engagement for the archaeological program with the wider Aboriginal consultation process in place for the project.

Typically, the engagement would include notification to interested communities of any upcoming archaeological field work as well as requesting First Nations monitors to join our archaeological crews during the survey, excavation, and strategy formulation processes. No allowance for the arrangement for the presence and payment of First Nations monitors has been included in our proposal as part of the Stage 1-2 archaeological assessment works proposed herein. Any Aboriginal engagement practices conducted during the course of the project are to comply with the MTCS's 2011 Standards and Guidelines for Consultant Archaeologists and the draft technical bulletin on Engaging Aboriginal Communities in Archaeology.

Should the Town wish to pursue supplementary Aboriginal consultation as recommended by Stantec as part of the archaeological assessments, then the subsequent additional scope of work including a schedule and price is to be discussed with the Town.

3. Evaluation of Alternative Solutions

An evaluation matrix is to be developed indicating benefits and disadvantages of each alternative solution with respect to evaluation criteria. Potential criteria considered for evaluation matrix include Engineering (traffic safety considerations, construction staging), Social Environment (pedestrian/cyclist access, recreation, noise, compatibility with the town's land use and transportation policies), Natural Environment (terrestrial habitat and vegetation), Financial (construction and engineering costs), Property impacts, etc.

- 4. Establish recommended alternative solution(s);
- 5. Determine potential environmental impacts and mitigation measures;
- 6. Prepare conceptual drawings/sketches;
- 7. Prepare conceptual opinions of probable capital & construction costs;
- 8. Preparation and coordination of one (1) public information center (PIC), excluding all advertising and venue costs; document consultation procedures and feedback received;
- 9. Completion of Class Environmental Assessment Project File Report and review with Town;
- 10. Present Class EA Report to Town Council and obtain authorization to proceed to Notice of completion.
- 11. Prepare and coordinate advertisement of Notice of Completion with Town; address comments within prescribed 30-day review period. The Town will be responsible for all advertisements of the notice in any fashion such as mailings, newspapers, websites, etc. including all fees and expenses associated with the advertisements.
- 12. Finalize Class EA report based on feedback and file with the Town for Council adoption.



EXCLUSIONS

<u>General</u>

- One consolidated set of review comments from the Town on the draft report.
- It is assumed one review by the Town prior to finalizing the report.
- G-Tel locates.
- Advertising costs for Notices and PIC.
- PIC venue costs.

Terrestrial Habitat

- Scope only includes a desktop review of the Study Area and single season field investigations to confirm features.
- No more than three field days for investigation.
- No targeted wildlife surveys, including surveys for Species at Risk and rare species.
- No tree inventories.
- Additional study and authorization requirements under the Endangered Species Act will be identified; however, submission of an Information Gathering Form or application under the Act are excluded.

Fisheries Habitat/Aquatic Resources

- Field work to consist of a single season visit to an estimated six (6) watercourse crossings.
- Watercourse crossings are accessible and, where necessary, permission to access crossings will be secured by the Town.
- No Species at Risk (SAR) permitting will be required.
- No Department of Fisheries and Oceans (DFO) Request for Review will be required.

Contamination Overview Study

- No Phase I or II ESA, DSS, or EMMP are required to be completed. If required, separate cost estimates and work programs will be presented to the Town for consideration.
- No environmental soil or groundwater sampling or building material sampling will be conducted as part of the currently proposed work program. After completion of the COS, a separate cost estimate and work program could be presented to the Town for these tasks (if required).
- No more than one (1) previously existing environmental report for the project will be reviewed as part of the COS.

Noise Assessments

- No ambient sound or vibration measurements.
- No vibration assessment.
- No more than one (1) assessment of one alternative.

Archeological/Heritage Assessments

- It is assumed that clear and unfettered access to the study area will be granted or be able to be secured by the Town on behalf of Stantec.
- Conditions detrimental to the identification and documentation of areas of archaeological potential, including snow covered ground, crop overburden, heavy rains, etc., will delay the Stage 1 and Stage 2 property inspections. The property inspections will be conducted when, in Stantec's opinion, the ground conditions will meet the MTCS' stipulations. Stantec will not be held responsible for any delays or costs associated with such delays caused by detrimental field conditions.
- Stantec will not be held responsible for any delays or additional costs associated with delays or changes in the methodological approach resulting from First Nations issues. Should methodological



changes arise as a result of First Nations involvement, a change in scope and budget may be required and will be prepared in consultation with the Town.

- No more than one (1) MTCS revision to all archaeological assessment reports. If the MTCS requires extra edits outside of MTCS' standard practice, a change of scope in work and budget may be needed and will be prepared by Stantec in consultation with the Town.
- Every archaeological investigation involves the risk of encountering human remains. If human remains are uncovered, Stantec will inform the client immediately and all archaeological work being conducted at the site in question will cease until such time the required approvals are in place to allow the resumption of the investigations. Stantec will not be held responsible in any way for delays or additional costs associated with the discovery of human remains.

The engineering budget fee established for this assignment is largely based on our experience on similar projects. 1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

- 1. The report from the Manager of Roads and Fleet dated January 9, 2018 regarding the Multi-Use Tractor Unit Tender Results **BE RECEIVED**;
- 2. An agreement with Work Equipment Ltd. for the purchase of a Multi-Use Tractor Unit **BE APPROVED** in the amount of \$193,242.24.00 (including Non-Recoverable H.S.T.);
- **3.** The Treasurer **BE DIRECTED** to internally finance the equipment purchase for a 5 year period in accordance with the calculation in Appendix A;
- **4.** The Treasurer **BE DIRECTED** to charge \$3,357 to the Winter Control and the Parks Vehicle and Equipment Maintenance Operating Budget Accounts based on seasonal use of the equipment; and,
- 5. **By-law 2018-07** being a by-law to enter into an agreement with Work Equipment Limited, Box 244, Courtland, Ontario, N0J 1E0 for the purchase of a Multi-Use Tractor Unit be taken as having been read three times and finally passed and the Mayor and Clerk **BE AUTHORIZED** to sign same.

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

On December 12, 2017, Council approved the Winter Sidewalks Maintenance Program. The Town recently advertised on the Town's website using the Bids and Tenders bidding system for a Municipal Tractor and Attachments. This purchase will be utilized in the Winter Sidewalks Maintenance Program.

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

On December 19, 2017, the Town advertised tenders for the Municipal Tractor and Attachments. The tenders were picked up by 5 companies. Tenders closed at 11:00 a.m. on Tuesday, January 9, 2018. The Town received 2 tender submissions and a public tender opening was held shortly after 11:00 a.m.

Administration has completed a review of the tenders received to ensure there were no mathematical errors in the tenders. The final tender results are as follows:

Company	Total Tender
Work Equipment Ltd.	\$189,900.00
Joe Johnson Equipment Inc.	\$196,157.10

The prices are excluding HST.

The tractor will include a folding V plow, a rear mounted drop salter/spreader, a 51" snow blower and a boomfail mower. This unit will be utilized to complete the Winter Sidewalk Maintenance Program as well as provide roadside ditch brushing and weed maintenance during the summer months ensuring that this piece of equipment is fully utilized throughout the year. Public Works currently **contracts out** the roadside ditch brushing and weed maintenance services. This will be **eliminated** with this purchase.

4. <u>RISK ANALYSIS:</u>

This unit will assist Roads staff in completing Winter Sidewalk Maintenance Program. The unit will be outfitted with GPS to track location and operation of the unit for plowing and salting. This information will be utilized in claims involving slip and fall injuries.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

This original sidewalk winter control report approved by Council had the follow wording with regards to financing options:

"Administration is recommending the purchase of a Trackless MT-7 with winter attachment and boom mower for summer use at a sum of \$189,900.00. The unit would be leased-to-own over a fiveyear duration with 20% remaining to be paid out at the end of the five years. The monthly amount is approximately \$3,100.00. This lease will be covered under the Public Work Winter Control Operating budget."

Upon further review of the leasing and financing options it was determined that an alternative financing plan of a self-funded monthly repayment plan would provide financial advantage to the town.

Interest rates in the estimated lease were 4.9% and should the town finance the equipment internally on the operating line of credit and charge back the winter control budget monthly the current rate would be 2.35%.

This change in interest rate and funding model will save interest cost of \$10,429 over the five year period.

Since the town would be internally financing the equipment over a period of 60 months it would no longer be feasible to have the 20% buyout option on the equipment. This would increase the monthly contribution to the winter control budget from \$3,100 to \$3,357 a month; however the buyout of \$37,980 under the leasing option would no longer be needed.

The five year financing plan is presented in detail under Appendix A to this report at the current rate of 2.35%.

6. <u>CONSULTATIONS</u>:

Administration has checked the reference provided by the successful bidder. Financial Services consulted with the Town's Account Manager at our financial institution with regards to financing strategies.

7. <u>CONCLUSION</u>:

This unit will assist staff with Winter Sidewalk Maintenance Program as well as provide roadside ditch brush and weed maintenance. This unit has a variety of additional attachments which can be obtained in the future to assist staff in maintaining the Town's infrastructure

1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

- 1. The report from the Fire Chief dated December 8, 2017 regarding Open Air Fires Consultation Results and Final Report **BE RECEIVED**;
- 2. The revised Open Air Fires By-law attached, (Appendix "3") **BE APPROVED**, as presented;
- 3. **By-law 2018-01** being a by-law to regulate the setting of open air fires, fire prevention, including the prevention of the spreading of fires; and, establishing the conditions associated with where open air fires may be set, be taken as having been read three times and finally passed and the Mayor and Clerk **BE AUTHORIZED** to sign same; and,
- 4. The Town of Amherstburg User Fee by-law be amended to reflect the additional fees set out in **By-law 2018-01**.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Existing municipal open air fire regulations (By-law 1998-91) are designed to provide controls for the prevention of fires and the spreading of fires for the protection of life and property. "Open air fire" includes brush fires used to dispose of wood or brush in a controlled fashion, campfires, chimineas and outdoor fireplaces but does not include barbecues.

Open Air Fires presently are banned across the municipality, with the exception of areas where farming is conducted, following proper notification.

Currently, illegal open air fires and primarily campfires are conducted and occur regularly throughout the municipality without notice, regulation nor appropriate resources to enforce the current by-law which prohibits open air fires throughout the developed areas of the Town of Amherstburg.

As an update to previous reports, since February 2016 until **November 30th,2017** (21 Months) the Fire Service has responded to 75 calls associated with open fires. A cost associated with paying volunteer fire fighters for these responses has totaled \$16,176.00. In the same time period \$14,625.00 was invoiced for 39 of the occurrences. As a solution to balancing the public desire to allow open air fires, continue farming business operations and to provide controls for the prevention of fires and the spreading of fires for the protection of life and property, a proposed new by-law and policy was drafted during the Summer of 2017 for discussion purposes, the By-law included many features contained in other municipal by-laws. It also included a permit program for open air fires with a fee for the setting of open air campfires and outdoor fireplaces, and a fee for specific event campfires with special circumstances, as well as minimum application requirements.

The rural farming community also requires the ability to conduct open burning as part of farming business operations and land clearing activities. Consistent with the current bylaw, the drafted bylaw 2018-01 states farming businesses will not incur a fee but are required to have the site inspected and approved and shall notify the Fire Department at least 2 hrs prior to the commencement of open fire operations.

For fire prevention and public safety education purposes, the size of the fire; permitted materials to be burned; permitted distances from other material and public roadways are stipulated. Open air fire supervision requirements and precautionary measures to be taken is outlined in the by-law.

To address feedback received, each property should be assessed by Fire Department staff to determine fire safety conditions as well as a demand within the community. Open air Campfires will be permitted where the conditions permit throughout the municipality but, Bon Fires and larger brush burning will continue to not be permitted in any residential area.

The by-law establishes a Town-wide permit program for open air fires with an annual \$25 fee for the setting of open air fires, and a \$75 fee for specific event campfires and outdoor fireplaces with special circumstances, as well as minimum application requirements.

As directed by Council, a series of three (3) evening public open house sessions were held for the Public to receive information and provide comment on August 17th, September 12th & 26th 2017. In addition, an anonymous survey for public input was conducted throughout the period. The results of public input is contained in (Appendix 1) attached to this report.

Based on the feedback received a series of issues are presented for council consideration & are included in (Appendix 2) and include but are not limited to:

- The most popular request is to allow small Campfires.
- The most complained about activity received by the Department is Large Bon-Fire activity.
- The most Contentious issue raised is the smoke production. (This is addressed in the by-law through requiring the fire to be immediately extinguished after use and the items permitted to be burned.)

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

Effective January 1, 2003, the authority previously contained in the Municipal Act for dealing with fire protection and fire prevention matters was transferred to the *Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997*, S.O. 1997, c.4, as amended (the "FPPA"). Section 7.1 of the FPPA states that a council of a municipality may pass by-laws:

- regulating fire prevention, including the prevention of the spreading of fires; and,
- regulating the setting of open air fires, including establishing the times during which open air fires may be set.

The Town of Amherstburg inherited from the former municipalities by-laws regulating the setting of open air fires and outlining conditions under which these fires may be set. Generally, the current by-law (1998-91) provides for the prohibition of open air fires in all areas except land where farming is being conducted.

Open air fire by-laws are designed to control the maintenance of satisfactory conditions for the prevention and spreading of fires for the protection of life and property.

Open air burning and campfires are currently taking place in all (Urban, Sub-Urban and Rural) areas of the Town of Amherstburg. The current situation where campfires are not permitted anywhere is resulting in illegal burns taking place in Spring, Summer and Fall with no appropriate controls in place. The burning of Grass and Leaves also takes place intermittently and feedback indicates that current Yard Waste programs are not at some times of year meeting the needs of many properties.

Enforcement of the current by-law is not manageable with current resources. Fire Services is limited to responding to complaints with very little information often resulting in full station responses. Previously reported is that since February of 2016 until July of 2017 (17 Months) the Fire Service had responded to 54 calls associated with open fires. A cost associated with paying volunteer fire fighters for these responses had totaled almost \$12,480.00. The fee collected through the Current Municipal Fees Bylaw only partially offset the cost of administration and enforcement. In the same time period \$6,975.00 was invoiced for 19 of the occurrences. Fire administration provided additional training, amended operating processes and as a result since February 2016 until **November 30th,2017** (21 Months) the Fire Service has responded to 75 calls associated with open fires. A cost associated with paying volunteer fire fighters for these responses has now totaled \$16,176.00. In the same time period \$14,625.00 was invoiced for 39 of the occurrences, providing a much improved cost recovery situation.

Open Air Fire By-laws are designed to control the maintenance of satisfactory conditions for the prevention and spreading of fires for the protection of life and property. Council should consider replacing the existing bylaw with an Open Air Fire By-law and permit program (Appendix 3) that reflects the advice provided by Fire Administration (Appendix 2) and the input received by the public included as (Appendix 1).

Doing so, will ensure Fire Services is aware of where Open- Air fires are conducted and will have suitable opportunity to ensure sites are safe and fires are conducted with proper safety measures in place.

Consideration should be given to replacement of the existing open air fire bylaw to establish up to date standardized conditions for permits and widely accepted open air fire regulations and practices for public safety.

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

Open air fire means the burning of material such as wood and brush where the flame is not wholly contained and is, thereby, open to the air, and includes camp fires, chimineas and outdoor fireplaces but, does not include propane, Natural Gas and Briquette type barbecues.

The Ontario Fire Code states that open air fires shall not be permitted unless approved by the Chief Fire Official, or unless such fires consists of a small confined fire, supervised at all times and used to cook food on a grill or a barbecue. It is also identified that fires for the purpose of cooking be extinguished immediately after the food is cooked. The purpose of this requirement is to protect people and communities from the risk of being exposed to fire or related irritants.

The Fire Chief is responsible for granting approvals for open air fires at the municipal level. If necessary, Fire Services is also responsible for inspecting the proposed site.

Overview of An Open Air Fire By-law

The final proposed Open Air Fire By-law, would include the following provisions found in the existing municipal by-law:

- an explanation of what constitutes "open air fire";
- conditions under which open air fires may be conducted with the approval of the Chief Fire Official; and,
- areas by land use type in which open air fires may take place, in consideration of prevention of fires and public safety.
- Farm Businesses will not be negatively impacted and will retain most of the current practices.

The proposed by-law permits campfires only within the settlement areas of the municipality but restricts their size to 3 ft. X 3 ft. (1mX1m) and only where such burning can be carried out safely based on an approved site inspection and provides for control over open air fires. **Bonfires will not be allowed** in any residential location within the municipality.

The Rural Areas of the Municipality where Farming is conducted will continue to be allowed Land Clearing and Brush Burning.

Open Air Fires – Permit Program

Permit Program

The proposed by-law would establish an annual permit program for open air fires (Camp Fires) to help identify locations where these activities are planned.

The permit program will enable the Amherstburg Fire Department to provide applicants with fire prevention information and impose safety related conditions as appropriate. The Fire Chief would only issue such permits once the applicant has met all the conditions in accordance with the municipal and provincial requirements. An open-air fire permit does not relieve the applicant of his/her responsibility to comply with all other regulations or statutes.

Processing fees of \$25 (Annual Open Air Fire Permit) and \$75 (Specific Event Open Air Fire Permit) respectively are proposed for the processing of the permits. These fees will enable the Town to recover related administration costs.

General Open Air Fire Restrictions

The proposed by-law provides that:

- there be no open air fires when a ban on open air fires is issued by the Fire Chief
- in all of the Municipality, a permit be obtained
- Open air fires are permitted only in areas that have a site inspection prior and with a permit.
- no open air fires occur before sunrise and after sunset for the burning of brush; and
- provisions for registered farm business operations

Open air fires would be further regulated in relation to: the method used to light the fire; the size of the fire; prohibited material(s) being burned; (i.e. grass, leaves, garbage, pressure or creosote treated wood, plastics or other combustibles that produce toxic fumes or excessive smoke are prohibited); distances from other combustible material (including buildings, decks and fences) and distances from public roadways (setbacks). Campfires must be completely extinguished after use and not be allowed to smolder.

At certain times of the year and as conditions warrant, the Fire Chief may issue a complete ban on open air fires. When a ban is issued, all open air fires are prohibited with the exception of actual cooking that is taking place on a barbecue. For public health and safety reasons, the Fire Chief can limit open air fires even when a permit has been issued.

Campfires and Outdoor Fireplaces

In addition to the general requirements for open air fires, additional requirements specific to campfires and outdoor manufactured fireplaces would be included in the proposed by-law. These additional requirements recognize the differences between certain types of open air fires, while still providing for public safety.

The Ontario Fire Marshal (OFM) has stated that the use of outdoor fireplaces such as chimineas should be classified as an open air fire and be treated as such. The proposed by-law classifies outdoor fireplaces as open air fires. Outdoor fireplaces and chimineas vary in design from a steel firebox with a screened opening and short vent stack to a clay fire pot with an opening for fuel loading and a short vent stack, similar in appearance to a large flower vase, each having specific requirements. Barbecues may be used outdoors in all areas of the Town except balconies without prior authorization from the Fire Chief.

Specific Events

The proposed by-law provides that camp fires or open air fires in an outdoor fireplace in an urban area, or "no burn" zone, may be authorized by the Fire Chief for cultural, religious or recreational specific events held by a legally-recognized not-for-profit organizations or religious institutions on approved sites, subject to specific guidelines for the event. A fee of \$75 is proposed for this one-time permit, which is valid only for the day or days of the specific event.

ENVIRONMENTAL CONSIDERATIONS

The proposed by-law recognizes that only untreated wood may be burnt, thereby reducing any environmental concerns which may be associated with burning, and maintains the intent of by-law 2014-109 regarding emissions from solid fuel burning appliances.

Fires on waterways or ice over waterways (lakes, rivers, streams) is prohibited.

Worthy of note is that the proposed by-law is superseded by any, and all, provincial and/or federal statutes as they pertain to open air fires.

Rural Implications

Rural distinctiveness recognized by the former municipal regulations has been maintained or has undergone minimal modification to help its representation in the context of the proposed by-law.

4. <u>RISK ANALYSIS:</u>

Open air burning and campfires will continue to take place in all (Urban, Sub-Urban and Rural) areas of the Town of Amherstburg. The current situation where illegal burns take place in Spring Summer and Fall with no appropriate controls in place will continue if changes are not made. Enforcement of the current by-law is not manageable with current resources. Fire Services is currently limited to responding to complaints. Costs to ratepayers will continue to rise without appropriate controls and Public Education.

5. FINANCIAL MATTERS:

The fees collected from the proposed permit program will be expected to partially offset the cost of administration and enforcement. The fees have been set at nominal rates in order to encourage compliance and to assist with Fire Service awareness.

The estimated intake on the program is hard to predict however 1,000 properties in Amherstburg would lead to the following scenario:

Estimated cost of conducting 1,000 inspections is \$21,962 estimated cost for the program to reach all 9000 properties would be \$197,658.

6. <u>CONSULTATIONS</u>:

- Essex County Municipalities, City of Chatham Kent, City of Ottawa, City of Hamilton, City of Brandon Man.
- A series of Three (3) evening public open house sessions was provided on August 17th, September 12 & 26, 2017. and an Anonymous Survey (Appendix 1)

7. <u>CONCLUSION</u>:

Control of Open Air Burning is necessary and begins with accurate information on where it is occurring within the municipality. Education on proper safe practices is required and strict consistent enforcement is useful to ensure an acceptable level of public safety.

Open Burn Public Consultations Summary

Three Session were held on August 17th, September 12th, and September 26th, 2017

We had approximately 100 residents attend across the three sessions. The groups were equally split between for a change and against a change. There was no overwhelming or significantly repeated comments or recommendations offered by the groups.

Following the summary are the transcribed comments from each meeting.

<u>Below are comments provided by the public that were for our consideration at more than one meeting or</u> <u>suggested more than once across the three sessions.</u>

Permits:

In favour of permit system but change the fee.
Repeat offenders to the bylaw should be banned from acquiring a permit.
Do away with the Permit system.

Fees:

Implement a onetime fee good forever

Restrictions:

Make clearance requirements smaller. Restrict in town but not in rural areas of the municipality

Miscellaneous:

Full Public Education program should be included with changes to the bylaw.Open yard waste center to deal with the large amount of yard waste.Nuisance callers should be fined

Opposed:

This would lower life quality for a family member with health problems.

Q15 I feel I have enough information to burn safely





Q16 I feel I need more information on safe practices for Open Air Burning





Q17 I have the tools and suppression resources to properly supervise my fire





Q18 I have enough space on my property to be a safe distance from combustibles and structures



Q19 I'm safe, but I have concerns about my neighbours





















BY-LAW NO. 2018-01

By-law to regulate open air burning within the Town of Amherstburg

WHEREAS the Municipal Act, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended authorizes the municipality to regulate matters related to the health, safety and well-being of persons;

AND WHEREAS Section 7.1 (1) (a) of the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, S.O. 1997, c. 4, as amended provides that a Council of a municipality may pass By-laws regulating fire prevention, including the prevention of spreading fire;

AND WHEREAS Section 7.1 (1) (b) of the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, S.O. 1997, c. 4, as amended provides that a Council of a municipality may pass By-laws regulating the Setting of Open Air Fires, including establishing the times during which Open Air Fires may be Set;

AND WHEREAS Section 391 states that a municipality may pass by-laws imposing fees or charges on any class of Persons for services or activities provided or done by or on behalf of it; and

AND WHEREAS the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg deems it expedient to regulate the setting of Open Air Fires, including establishing the times during which Open Air Fires may be Set.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg enacts as follows:

1. <u>DEFINITIONS</u>

In this by-law:

"**Act**" means the Fire Protection and Prevention Act, 1997, S.O. 1997, c.4, as amended, and the regulations enacted thereunder as amended from time to time;

"Adverse Effect" includes:

- i. impairment of the quality of the natural environment for any use that can be made of it
- ii. injury or damage to property or to plant or animal life
- iii. harm or material discomfort to any Person
- iv. an adverse effect on the health of any Person
- v. impairment of the safety of any Person
- vi. rendering any property or plant or animal life unfit for human use
- vii. loss of enjoyment of normal use of property
- viii. interference with the normal conduct of business
- ix. nuisances including but not limited to excessive smoke, odour, dust, airborne sparks, embers or reduced visibility on roadways, railways or airfields
- x. Smoke that enters into a Building located on other property that may cause discomfort or loss of enjoyment to persons;

"**Applicant**" means a Person eighteen (18) years of age or more who is a registered legal Owner of the property upon which the Open Air Fire is to be burned or a Person eighteen (18) years of age or more who is the Occupier of the property up on which the Open Air Fire is to be burned and who has been provided with permission by a registered legal Owner of the property to burn an Open Air Fire;

"**Barbeque**" means a portable or fixed device fueled by propane, natural gas or charcoal briquettes and designed and intended solely for the cooking of food in the open air, but does not include Outdoor Fireplaces and Campfires;

"Bon Fire" means a fire on a Farm contained by non-Combustibles and exceeds 1m in length X 1m in width X 1m height is for recreational purposes and/or occurs after sunset and before sunrise;

"Brush Fire" means an open air fire where the size of the material to be burned is greater than 1mX1mX1m and does not exceed 3m in height, or width or length, and is set for the purpose of burning wood, tree limbs, and branches;

"**Building**" means any structure having a roof supported by walls and/or columns which is used or intended to be used for the shelter accommodation or enclosure of Persons animals or chattels;

"**Burn drum**" means an Open Air Fire Set and Maintained in an open top steel barrel that does not exceed 1.5 m in diameter and 1.5 m in height and where the Open Air Fire is Set and Maintained for the purposes of burning wood, tree limbs, branches and non-Compostable Material limited to paper and sisal twine;

"**Campfire**" means a fire designed for cooking, recreational enjoyment or warmth that meets the following conditions:

- i. the site of the fire is bare rock or other non-Combustible Material
- ii. the space above the one metre area around the fire is at least three metres from vegetation and
- iii. the fire does not exceed one metre in height and one metre in diameter.

"**Campground**" means an area of land owned or operated by a Person and that contains camp sites for the purpose of providing overnight accommodation for tents and trailers in exchange for monetary payment;

"Cooking Fire" is defined as a fire created for the sole purpose of cooking food and the burning consists of a small, confined fire that is supervised at all times and used to cook food on a grill or Barbecue. The Cooking Fire must be fully Extinguished after the food is cooked.

"Combustible material" means material capable of burning including wood, paper, plastic and vegetation;

"Council" means the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg;

"**Dangerous condition**" means any condition as determined by the Fire Chief that increases the risk of the spread of a fire or is adverse to public safety;

"**Extinguish**" means an Open Air Fire that fully ceases from burning to a degree that the ashes are cold or no longer emits heat ensuring smouldering of material does not occur. (A buried fire is not considered extinguished);

"Farm" means land devoted to the practice of farming and used primarily for the raising of livestock or the production, storage or processing of agricultural and horticultural produce or foods but does not include land used only as a residential occupancy. The Farm shall be registered as a farming business as defined in the *Farm Registration and Farm Organizations Funding Act, 1993*, S.O. 1993, c. 21, as amended;

"Fire ban" means a period of time during which the Fire Chief declares a total ban on Open Air Fires;

"Firebreak" means open space that surrounds an Open Air Fire and serves as a noncombustible obstacle to the spread of fire;

"Fire Chief" means the person appointed by Town Council as Fire Chief for the Town or authorized designate, and for the purposes of this by-law includes Municipal Law Enforcement Officer;

"**Highway**" means a common and public highway, street, avenue, parkway, driveway, square, place, bridge, viaduct or trestle, designed and intended for, or used by, the general public for the passage of vehicles and includes the area between the lateral property lines thereof;

"Maintain" means to allow an Open Air Fire to continue to burn, and "maintained" and "maintaining" have a corresponding meaning;

"Municipal Law Enforcement Officer" means an individual appointed by the Town for the purpose of enforcing Town by-laws;

"**Occupant**" means any Person or Persons over the age of eighteen (18) years in possession of the property;

"**Open Air Fire**" means the burning of material such as untreated wood, tree limbs and branches where the flame is not wholly contained and includes Campfires, Bonfires, Burn Drums, Brush Burning, Windrows and Outdoor Fireplaces, but does not include Barbecues and Personal Warming Devices;

"Open Air Fire Permit (Permit)" means a written conditional authorization issued and administered by the Fire Chief to Set an Open Air Fire, as per any restrictions and conditions contained within this by-law or as may be specified on the Open Air Permit itself;

"Outdoor Fireplace Unit or Recreational Fireplace Unit" means a: manufactured wood- burning appliance, site-built masonry fireplace, fire pit, chimenea, clay or metal fireplace, portable wood-burning devices used for outdoor recreation or heating, or other enclosed container used outdoors and not fueled by natural gas or propane and designed to hold a small fire, not exceeding one metre (3.2 feet) in any direction; but does not include pellet fuelled Barbeques or industrial 'wood-waste' combustors;

"**Owner**" shall include any Person who is an owner of land either jointly or in common with any other Person or persons and shall include any or all of such persons;

"**Permit Holder**" means a Person eighteen (18) years of age or more to whom an Open Air Permit has been issued by the Fire Chief;

"**Person**" means any individual, Owner, Occupant, association, firm, partnership, corporation, agent or trustee and the heirs, executors, or other legal representatives of a Person to whom the context can apply according to law;

"**Personal warming device**" means a gas-fueled appliance used for personal warming that is in conformance with the Technical Standards and Safety Act, 2000, S.O. 2000, c. 16, as may be amended from time to time, is for outdoor use and is installed in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions;

"Prohibited Materials" include:

- i. Construction and demolition waste or materials including roofing tiles or shingles
- ii. Hazardous substances including but not limited to batteries, household chemicals, pesticides, asbestos, used oil, gasoline, paints, varnishes, and solvents
- iii. Furniture and appliances
- iv. Tires and rubber materials
- v. Any plastic materials including but not limited to nylon, PVC or ABS plastics, polystyrene or urethane foam, and synthetic fabrics, plastic films and plastic

containers.

vi. Newspaper, cardboard, office paper

- vii. Treated or painted wood including but not limited to plywood, composite wood products or other wood products that are painted, varnished or treated with preservatives.
- viii. Leaves and grass clippings except leaves attached to tree limbs;

"**Restricted Area**" means areas where types of Open Air Fires are prohibited or Permits are denied by the Fire Chief;

"Sensitive Receptor Place" include:

- i. A health care facility
- ii. A senior citizens' residence or long-term care facility
- iii. A child care facility during operating hours
- iv. An educational facility during operating hours
- v. An environmentally sensitive area
- vi. A place specified by the Town as a place where discharges of smoke may cause a risk to human health;

"Set" means to light an Open Air Fire, and "setting" has a corresponding meaning;

"Town" means the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg;

"Windrow" means an Open Air Fire on a Farm where the size of the material to be burned does not exceed 50 m in length, 5 m in width and 3 m in height and that is set and maintained solely for the purposes of burning wood, tree limbs and branches as part of farming practices for clearing agricultural land.

2. INTERPRETATION

- 2.1 In this by-law, a word interpreted in the singular number has a corresponding meaning when used in the plural.
- 2.2 Nothing in this by-law shall be interpreted as reducing or eliminating compliance with the provisions of all applicable Federal or Provincial statutes and regulations related to open air burning, and in particular the Fire Protection and Prevention Act.
- 2.3 In this by-law the word "metre" shall be represented by the abbreviation "m" and the word "centimeter" shall be represented by the abbreviation "cm".
- 2.4 The by-law includes the Schedules annexed hereto, and the Schedules are hereby declared to form part of this by-law.

3. **PROHIBITIONS**

- 3.1 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire without an Open Air Permit.
- 3.2 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire in a Restricted Area.
- 3.3 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire during a Fire Ban.
- 3.4 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire that burns Prohibited Materials.
- 3.5 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire in a manner that violates a condition of the Open Air Permit in Section 6, 7, 8, or 9.
- 3.6 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire on any roadway, Highway,

park, easement, or on ice of a lake, pond, stream or body of water.

- 3.7 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire on public property owned or operated by the Town without written permission of the Fire Chief and/or Council.
- 3.8 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire where it causes Adverse Effects.
- 3.9 No Person shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire within 100 m from a Sensitive Receptor Place.
- 3.10 No person shall set or Maintain an Open Air Fire defined as a Bon Fire or Windrow, unless on a Farm and under a valid Permit.
- 3.11 No Person shall obstruct, hinder or otherwise interfere with a Municipal Law Enforcement Officer in the lawful carrying out of their duties and responsibilities under the provisions of this by-law.

4. EXEMPTIONS

- 4.1 The Amherstburg Fire Department shall be exempt from the provisions of this by law with respect to Open Air Fires for the purposes of training, educating individuals on fire safety or for research purposes.
- 4.2 Professional fire prevention trainers shall be exempt from the provisions of this by-law with respect to Open Air Fires set for the purposes of fire safety training pursuant to Section 2.8.2.1 of the Fire Code.
- 4.3 The Town shall be exempt from the provisions of this by-law with respect to Open Air Fires related to municipal works.
- 4.4 The use of a Barbeque or a Personal Warming Device is exempt from obtaining an Open Air Fire Permit

5. OPEN AIR FIRE PERMIT

- 5.1 Any Person eighteen (18) years of age or older may make a written application for an Open Air Fire Permit to the Fire Chief prior to the proposed date of the first Open Air Fire.
- 5.2 Any Person Owning or operating a Campground may make a written application for an Open Air Fire Permit to the Fire Chief prior to the proposed date of the first Open Air Fire.
- 5.3 Any Person Owning and operating a Farm may make a written application for an Open Air Fire Permit to the Fire Chief prior to the proposed date of the first Open Air Fire.
- 5.4 The application shall include:
 - 5.4.1 the name, address, email address and phone number of the Applicant;
 - 5.4.2 the Owner's written consent to an Open Air Fire, if the Applicant is not the Owner of the property;
 - 5.4.3 the municipal address of the location of the proposed Open Air Fire;
 - 5.4.4 the Open Air Fire Permit fee;
 - 5.4.5 Farm business registration number if required;

- 5.4.6 other information as may be required by the Fire Chief;
- 5.5 A Permit is valid on the date of issue and for the balance of the calendar year in which the permit is issued.
- 5.6 The Fire Chief reserves the right to issue or deny issuing an Open Air Fire Permit.

6. OPEN AIR FIRE PERMIT CONDITIONS

- 6.1 The Permit Holder shall comply at all times with the Act and all other applicable municipal by-laws, provincial and federal laws.
- 6.2 A Permit for an Open Air Fire is not transferable to another Person or to a new location.
- 6.3 No Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire unless the Permit Holder:
 - 6.3.1 Open-Air burning shall be constantly attended and supervised by a competent Person of at least eighteen (18) years of age to ensure that the Fire is kept under control. The Person shall have readily available for use such Fire Extinguishing equipment as may be necessary for the total control of the fire.
 - 6.3.2 Prior to leaving the site, the Open-Air Fire shall be completely Extinguished.
 - 6.3.3 Produces his or her Permit upon being so directed by the Fire Chief;
 - 6.3.4 Has equipment capable of extinguishing the fire such as rakes, shovels, or water immediately available for use at the site of the Open Air Fire;
 - 6.3.5 Immediately extinguishes the Open Air Fire upon so ordered by the Fire Chief;
 - 6.3.6 Burns from sunrise to sunset on any day with the exceptions of Campfires and Outdoor Fireplaces;
 - 6.3.7 Burns only Combustible Materials or fuel permitted in a Burn Drum
 - 6.3.8 Complies to any additional conditions to a Permit imposed by the Fire Chief;
- 6.4 Where the material to be burned in an Open Air Fire is more than 1 m but less than 2m in length, width and height or is in a Burn Drum, no Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire:
 - 6.4.1 At a distance of less than 30 m from any Building, hedge, fence, lot line, overhead wiring or a Highway and at a distance of less than 25 m from another Open Air Fire;
 - 6.4.2 At a distance of at least a 15 m radius where Combustible Material other than a Building, hedge, fence, lot line or overhead wiring or a Highway is present;
- 6.5 Where the material to be burned in an Open Air Fire is between 2 m and 3 m in length, width and height or is in a Burn Drum, no Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain an Open Air Fire:

- 6.5.1 At a distance of less than 60 m from any building, hedge, fence, lot line overhead wiring or a Highway and at a distance of less than 25 m from another Open Air Fire;
- 6.5.2 At a distance of at least a 15 m radius where Combustible Material other than a Building, hedge, fence, lot line or overhead wiring or a Highway is present.

7 OPEN AIR PERMIT CAMPFIRE CONDITIONS

- 7.1 No Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain a Campfire unless the Permit Holder:
 - 7.1.1 Receives permission on the day of the proposed Campfire;
 - 7.1.2 Ensures that a Person eighteen (18) years of age or older Maintains constant watch and control over the Campfire at all times from the time of the Setting of the Campfire until it is fully Extinguished;
 - 7.1.3 Produces his or her Permit upon being so directed by the Fire Chief;
 - 7.1.4 Has equipment capable of Extinguishing the fire such as rakes, shovels, or water immediately available for use at the site of the Campfire;
 - 7.1.5 Immediately extinguishes the Campfire upon so ordered by the Fire Chief;
 - 7.1.6 Burns only dry firewood;
 - 7.1.7 Ensures the Campfire does not exceed 1 metre in width at the largest point or is piled higher than 1 metre in height;
 - 7.1.8 Ensures the Campfire is located at a distance of not less than 15 m from any Building, hedge, fence, lot line, Highway, overhead wiring or other Combustible Material;
 - 7.1.9 Ensure the Campfire is located a distance of not less than 10 m from any Building, hedge, fence, lot line, overhead wiring or other Combustible Material or a Highway where the Campfire is surrounded by non-Combustible material to a minimum height of 40 cm.
 - 7.1.10 Complies with any additional conditions to a Permit imposed by the Fire Chief.

8 OPEN AIR PERMIT OUTDOOR FIREPLACE CONDITIONS

- 8.1 No Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain an Outdoor Fireplace unless the Permit Holder:
 - 8.1.1 Receives permission on the day of the proposed Outdoor Fireplace Fire;
 - 8.1.2 Ensures that a Person eighteen (18) years of age or older Maintains constant watch and control over the Outdoor Fire Place Fire at all times from the time of the Setting of the Outdoor Fireplace Fire until it is fully extinguished;

- 8.1.3 Produces his or her Permit upon being so directed by the Fire Chief;
- 8.1.4 Has equipment capable of extinguishing the fire such as rakes, shovels, or water immediately available for use on the Outdoor Fireplace Fire;
- 8.1.5 Immediately extinguishes the Outdoor Fireplace Fire upon so ordered by the Fire Chief;
- 8.1.6 Burns only dry firewood;
- 8.1.7 Ensures the Outdoor Fireplace Fire is located at a distance of not less than 5 m from any Building, hedge, fence, lot line, Highway, overhead wiring or other Combustible Material or in accordance with manufacturer or listing agency (i.e ULC, Warnock Hersey)recommendations;
- 8.1.8 Complies with any additional conditions to a Permit imposed by the Fire Chief.

9 OPEN AIR PERMIT WINDROW, BRUSH FIRE & BONFIRE CONDITIONS

- 9.1 No Permit Holder shall Set or Maintain a Windrow, Brush Fire or a Bonfire unless the Permit Holder:
 - 9.1.1 Receives permission on the day of the proposed Windrow;
 - 9.1.2 Sets or Maintains a Windrow between Monday to Friday, inclusive;
 - 9.1.3 Ensures that a Person eighteen (18) years of age or older Maintains constant watch and control over the Windrow, Brush Fire or Bonfire at all times from the time of the Setting of the Windrow, Brush Fire or Bonfire until it is fully Extinguished;
 - 9.1.4 Produces his or her Permit upon being so directed by the Fire Chief;
 - 9.1.5 Has equipment capable of Extinguishing the fire such as rakes, shovels, or water immediately available for use at the site of the Windrow, Brush Fire or Bonfire;
 - 9.1.6 Immediately Extinguishes the Windrow, Brush Fire or Bonfire upon so ordered by the Fire Chief;
 - 9.1.7 Ensures the Windrow is located a distance of not less than 90 m from a Building, overhead wiring or Highway;
 - 9.1.8 Ensures the Windrow is located a distance of not less than 60 m from a wooden fence rail, hedge or standing timber;
 - 9.1.9 Ensures the Windrow is located a distance of not less than 30 m from any other Combustible Material;
 - 9.1.10 Ensures a firebreak of 5 m in width surrounds the Windrow until it is Extinguished;
 - 9.1.11 Ensures the Windrow is constructed at right angles to the prevailing wind direction;
 - 9.1.12 Ensure the Windrow is constructed on soil other than peat soil types;

- 9.1.13 Ensure there is a separation distance of at least 15 m between the ends of the Windrows and at least 25 m between parallel Windrows, of more than one Windrow is Set or Maintained at the same time;
- 9.1.14 Ensure the Windrow is Set first at its centre;
- 9.1.15 Ceases to add material to the Windrow if a Fire Ban comes into effect;
- 9.1.16 Ensures the Brush Fire is located a distance of not less than 30 m from any Lot Line, Fence, Building or Combustible Material;
- 9.1.17 Ensures the Bonfire is located a distance of not less than 15 m from any Building, hedge, fence, lot line, overhead wiring or other Combustible Material or a Highway;
- 9.1.18 Ensures the Bonfire is located a distance of not less than 15 m from any other Combustible Material.

10 SPECIAL EVENT OPEN AIR FIRE

- 10.1 A community not-for-profit organization or a religious institution may apply in writing to the Fire Chief for an Open Air Fire Permit to conduct Campfires or Open Air Fire in an Outdoor Fireplace for cultural, religious or recreational specific events.
- 10.2 The Fire Chief may issue an Open Air Permit subject to compliance with Section 6, 7 or 8 as applicable and any other conditions imposed by the Fire Chief.
- 10.3 A Permit issued for a special event is valid only for the days or days of the specific event.

11 PERMIT FEES

11.1 The non-refundable Permit application fee is set out in of the Town's User Fee By-law as amended from time to time.

12 <u>REVOCATION</u>

- 12.1 A Permit issued to a Permit Holder may be revoked by the Fire Chief if in his or her opinion a dangerous condition exists in or near the site of the Open Air Fire.
- 12.2 A Permit issued to a Permit Holder may be revoked by the Fire Chief if the Permit Holder fails to comply with the requirements of the Permit and any other provisions of this by-law.

13 OFFENCES AND PENALTIES

- 13.1 Every person who contravenes any section of this by-law is, upon conviction, guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a fine as provided for by the Provincial Offences Act, R.S.O. 1990, c.P. 33, as amended, and be subjected to any other penalties permitted by law for each offence.
- 13.2 If a contravention of this by-law results in Amherstburg Fire Services being dispatched to the property, the Owner may be invoiced at the discretion of the Fire Chief for the cost of the response in accordance with the Town's User Fee

By-law as amended from time to time.

14 SEVERABILITY

- 14.1 Should any paragraph, clause or provision of the By-law be declared invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, the same shall not affect the validity of the By-law as a whole or any part of thereof, other than the part which was declared to be invalid.
- 14.2 When any requirement of this by-law is at variance with any other by-law in effect in the Town or with any applicable provincial or federal statute or regulation, the more restrictive requirement shall apply unless otherwise stated in such legislation.

15 **<u>REPEAL</u>**

15.1 By-law 1998-91 being a by-law restricting the setting of fires within the Town of Amherstburg is hereby repealed.

16 SHORT TITLE

16.1 This by-law may be referred to as the Open Air Fire By-law.

Read a first, second and third time and finally passed this 8th day of January, 2018.

1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

- 1. The report from the Deputy Clerk dated January 8, 2018, regarding Revisions to the 2018 Calendar of Council Meetings **BE RECEIVED**;
- 2. The 2018 Calendar of Council Meetings **BE AMENDED** to observe Remembrance Day on Monday, November 12, 2018, and reflect that Town Hall will re-open on Wednesday, January 2, 2019, after the 2018 Christmas holiday break.

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

Council, at its meeting of October 23, 2017, approved the 2018 Calendar of Council Meetings. The approved calendar identified the Saturday, November 11, 2018 Remembrance Day holiday being observed on Friday, November 9, 2018. The approved calendar also identified Town Hall as closed on January 2, 2019.

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

Upon further review, it was noted that neighbouring municipalities are observing the Saturday, Remembrance Day holiday on Monday, November 12, 2018, rather than Friday, November 9, 2018.

As per the Employment Standards Act, it is at the employer's discretion whether to observe the holiday on the Friday or Monday if the holiday falls on a non-work day. As a result of the proposed revision, the Monday, November 12, 2018 Council Meeting would subsequently be moved to Tuesday, November 13, 2018.

1. <u>RECOMMENDATION:</u>

It is recommended that:

1. The report from the Manager of Environmental Services dated December 13, 2017, regarding the DWQMS – 2017 Status Update **BE RECEIVED for information.**

2. <u>BACKGROUND</u>:

The Safe Drinking Water Act, 2002 (SWDA) requires owners of municipal residential drinking water systems to have an accredited operating authority. In order to maintain accreditation, an operating authority must establish and maintain a quality management system (QMS). A requirement of the QMS is an annual Management Review where management evaluates the continuing suitability, adequacy and effectiveness of the Quality Management System.

3. <u>DISCUSSION</u>:

Management Review Meeting

Element 20 of the Drinking Water Quality Management Standards requires the creation and implementation of a Management Review procedure. It specifies that within a 12 month frequency a management review must take place where top management sees how the QMS has performed, identifies any deficiencies in the system, initiates improvements and reports the results to the owner. A management review must evaluate the continuing suitability, adequacy and effectiveness of the Quality Management System and includes consideration of:

a) incidents of regulatory non-compliance,

b) incidents of adverse drinking-water tests,

c) deviations from critical control point limits and response actions,

d) the efficacy of the risk assessment process,

e) internal and third-party audit results,

f) results of emergency response testing,

g) operational performance,

h) raw water supply and drinking water quality trends,

i) follow-up on action items from previous management reviews,

j) the status of management action items identified between reviews,

k) changes that could affect the Quality Management System,

I) consumer feedback,

m) the resources needed to maintain the Quality Management System,

n) the results of the infrastructure review,

o) Operational Plan currency, content and updates, and

p) staff suggestions.

Attached to this report are the minutes of the 2017 Management Review held on December 1, 2017.

Also attached, for Council's information, is the 2016 summary of Water Programs/ Activities which provides a quick reference of works completed in 2016. The 2017 summary is currently being prepared and will be brought to Council once completed.

DESCRIPTION

A. Incidents of Regulatory Non-Compliance

Dwayne reviewed the regulatory non-compliance from the January 31, 2017 Drinking Water System Inspection Report from the MOE.

1. Operators were not examining continuous monitoring test results or they were not examining the results within 72 hours of the test.

On December 8, 2016, the operator was unable to upload the filter effluent turbidity data from the data loggers in order to review the minimum, maximum and average data pertaining to December 7. On January 3, 2017, it was recognized by the operating authority, when compiling data for the monthly filter performance compliance report for December that the December 7 filter effluent trending charts were not in the binder file. The data was reviewed on January 3, 2017 albeit after the 72 hours.

Action(s) Required:

According to the operating authority, an operators meeting was held on January 19, 2017 to review and discuss the non-compliance of December 7 data review not within 72 hours. Operators were made aware of the proper procedures in order to properly review print and file filter effluent turbidity and chlorine residual data. No further action is required at this time.

2. The following instance(s) of non-compliance were also noted during the inspection:

The Ministry was unable to confirm that Filter 4 was disinfected in accordance with the AWWA C653 -Standard for Disinfection of Water Treatment Plants, as required by DWWP No. 026-201 Schedule B Condition 2.3, when it was taken out of service in 2016 for inspection/maintenance.

For more detail, please refer to Page 11 "Other Inspection Findings --Non-Compliance". Action(s) Required:

1. No later than May 3, 2017, the owner and operating authority shall review and update SOP No. OCWA-C3-26 entitled "Filter Maintenance – Annual". The SOP shall be in accordance with AWWA C653-13.

2. No later than May 3, 2017, the owner and operating authority shall obtain the current version of AWWA C653- Disinfection of Water Treatment Plants and include a copy of the document in the Amherstburg Area Water Treatment Plant Filter Maintenance binder. The current version is AWWA C653-13.

3. No later than May 3, 2017 the owner and operator shall review the following documents and train the operators working in the Amherstburg Area Water Treatment Plant on these documents: - Schedule B, Condition 2.3 of DWWP No. 026-201, and

- Schedule E, of MDWL No. 026-101 and

- SOP No. OCWA-C3-26 entitled "Filter Maintenance – Annual", (to be revised per action required item No. 1) and - AWWA C653-13 Disinfection of Water Treatment Plants

4. The owner and operating authority shall ensure that copies of the AWWA Standards specified in DWWP No. 026- 201 Schedule B, Condition 2.3, are always kept current for operator reference, and reference to the AWWA standards in any Standard Operating Procedures are also kept current.

B. Incidents of adverse drinking water tests

No incidents of adverse tests during this review period.

C. Deviations from critical control limits and response actions

No deviations from critical control points during this review period.

D. The efficacy of the risk assessment process

The annual review was performed by Dwayne Grondin on February 15, 2017. A full review will be completed in 2018 by the QMS team. At that time the new changes to consider the hazardous events listed by the MOECC will be incorporated.

E. Internal and third-party audit results

Internal Audit

An internal audit was performed on December 7, 2016 by Todd Hewitt. 1 Opportunity for Improvement was identified. The next internal audit is scheduled for December 2017.

Third Party Audit

NSF International performed the recertification audit on January 19 & 20, 2017. One Opportunity for Improvements was identified.

Next third party audit will be a desktop audit and will be scheduled for early 2018.

F. <u>Results of emergency response testing</u>

Procedure AMBP-107 "Watermain Break Repairs" and AMBP-108 "Water Valve Repair" were revised in April 2016 to reflect the Ministries changes in disinfection procedures. On May 30, 2017 a watermain break occurred on Richmond Street, the procedures were followed and the form was utilized.

G. Operational Performance

No issues were identified with overall operational issues.

H. Water supply and drinking water quality trends

The Ontario Clean Water Agency (OCWA) submitted the Annual Summary Report for the Amherstburg. No issues were identified.







Two Break and Enters, Police looking to ID Suspect(s)

On Thursday November 9, 2017 two Amherstburg businesses were broken into in the downtown core. At approximately 10:30pm, a male is captured on several surveillance systems on Richmond Street near Dalhousie Street walking east on Dalhousie Street and lingering in the area. At 10:45pm, the male entered the Musicland store at 59 Richmond Street by kicking in the front door. The male leaves the business five minutes later. A total of approximately \$500 in cash was taken rom the business. The same male then proceeds back towards Dalhousie Street.

At 11:55pm, a male, possibly the same individual or someone acting with the same individual, forced his way through the front door at the Artisan Grill, located around the corner from Musicland at 269 Dalhousie Street. The male in this incident was again captured on surveillance. He entered the restaurant but did not take anything once inside. The male is then seen getting into an older model GMC pick-up, with trailer mirrors, a metal rack behind the cab and a tool box in the bed. A second individual was waiting inside the pick-up.

Dear Police Services Board Members,

I am writing to your board concerning police clearances for the members of the Amherstburg St. Vincent de Paul Society. We have been serving the poor in our community since Oscar Bondy founded our group in 1953. His son Richard Oscar Bondy is presently still volunteering to this day. Dick and most of our Conference are now going through our second police clearance as required by our insurance company. The cost for him and his wife Denise (Hannah) is \$85.00 this time around since the RCMP computer decided he should be fingerprinted as well.

It is a common theme that most of our male members should now be fingerprinted like common criminals to prove their idenity. I think this is ridiculous and no way to treat volunteers who are doing their best to keep Amherstburg the safest community in Canada.

Tim McIsaac from the mission tells me his group is being put throuth the police clearance wringer as well.

Our SSVP conference is composed of single ladies and 15 couples ranging in age from 60 to 92. Most of the couples who go out on calls together never alone, have celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary. As well most of us have lived in this community our whole lives and if we were law breakers it would be well known to the local police.

I would appreciate it if we could be excused from the fingerprinting requirement at this time or at least the cost of this pointless exercise. A new policy concerning the treatment of volunteers who are requesting police clearance would also be most helpful. Thank you.

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

OAPSB INITIAL RESPONSE TO NEW POLICE SERVICES ACT

The new Police Services Act is the culmination of 5 years of consensus-building among police and community stakeholders, facilitated by the Government of Ontario. Overall, the result represents a balance of those interests.

The Ontario Association of Police Services Boards (OAPSB) has advocated hard over those past 5 years, in the public interest, for:

- 1. Legislation that features a **more effective** public safety model, bringing together the range of human service providers to address the root causes of marginalization, risk, crime and victimization
- 2. Legislation that features a **more efficient** policing model, facilitating the selection of non-police service providers for the performance of tasks that do not required a fully trained, fully armed police officer
- 3. Legislation that features **more relevant** police governance, namely:
 - Clarification of board roles, focussed on strategic governance of police operations, rather than human resource management
 - Mandatory board training
 - Better resourcing of boards in terms of information and advice, and decisionmaking support – in addition to that provided by police chiefs, and
 - Meaningful board evaluations and the provision of feedback to them
- 4. We've also advocated for more effective oversight of police, and modernized police labour practises that are more reflective of general labour practises across Ontario.

Overall, the new Police Services Act is a momentous attempt at satisfying all stakeholders. It features something for everyone, with relatively minor impositions. It **still needs some fine-tuning**, particularly in the following public-interest areas:

1. The new legislation is extremely prescriptive in what tasks can be **outsourced** to the private sector. The most obvious exclusions are court security and prisoner transport, which are more safely and more efficiently performed by the private sector in other jurisdictions. We suggest any restrictions on out-sourcing should be identified **in regulation**, **not legislation**, so that those restrictions can be



modernized over time, without the need to create an entirely new Act. We believe this is in the public interest.

- In preambles, the Government refers to OPP Detachment Boards' role as an "advisory" one. We request clarification that these boards are "governing" boards. Otherwise we can't see how this move strengthens governance, as the Government has consistently messaged.
- 3. The new legislation insists that at least one police board member must participate in police collective bargaining. This imposition doesn't happen anywhere else in any sector in Ontario, and shouldn't happen here. Boards establish direction and audit results; they aren't supposed to take action themselves. In police sector, board members are not recruited nor trained to collectively bargain. No one from Cabinet is required to negotiate directly with the OPP, and no one from a police board should be required to either. This unjustified imposition perpetuates a collective bargaining regime that has resulted in the highest municipal police salaries and benefits in the world, and is not in the public interest. In a recent survey of our members, 92% of the respondents felt that police boards should be able to assign the task of bargaining to professionals inside or outside the police service.

 - The review and processing of applications received after April 1, 2017 is expected to begin in early January.

b) Planning for the 2018/2019 Drainage Act Grants Program

i) <u>Grants for the Cost of Employing a Drainage Superintendent</u>: If your municipality employs an approved drainage superintendent and intends to apply for the superintendent grants in the upcoming fiscal year, please complete the attached form entitled "Grant Allocation Request Form - Fiscal Year 2018/19". Your allocation request must be received by our ministry on or before <u>February 28, 2018</u>. You are advised to read ADIP policy 4.1 prior to completing the form.

ii) <u>Construction/Improvement Projects</u>: Please read Section 2.7 of the ADIP policies. Once your municipality has given third reading to a by-law adopting an engineer's report for the construction or improvement of a municipal drain, you are encouraged to complete and submit a "Drain Queue Notification" form. - Read and comply with Section 4.0 of the ADIP policies.
- A claim for an approved drainage superintendent may be made for costs incurred from January 1 to December 31, 2017. The claim cannot exceed the budget allocation provided to your municipality.
- Claims must be submitted on the applicable OMAFRA grant application form. To obtain a Microsoft Excel electronic copy of these forms, contact Becky Curran at 519-826-4049 or becky.curran@ontario.ca.

REQUIRED SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION:

In accordance with ADIP Policy 4.3, each drainage superintendent grant application form must be accompanied with records of the time spent performing drainage superintendent duties.

APPLICATION DEADLINE: 5:00 p.m. on Wednesday, January 31, 2018

- Grant applications, complete with all supporting documentation, must be received on or before Wednesday, January 31, 2018 on the application forms provided by our Ministry.
- Emailed grant application packages will be accepted until the end of the deadline date. The grant application with original signatures and all supporting documentation must be received within one week of the deadline. If the original documents are not received, the application is deemed incomplete and will not be processed.
- Faxed applications will no longer be accepted.
- If, at the deadline your submitted application is not complete, it will not be processed even if supporting documentation is submitted later.

NOTES:

- 1. The grant claim for drainage superintendent services provided by engineering firms must be based on the date the service was provided, not the date of the invoice (e.g. invoice dated January 4, 2018 for services provide from October 1 to December 31, 2017 cannot be claimed as part of the 2018 drainage superintendent grant application).
- 2. If your municipality employed more than one drainage superintendent in 2017, separate grant applications must be submitted for each individual and signed by that individual.

APPLICATION & CLAIM PERIOD:

- Read and comply with Section 2.8 of the ADIP policies.
- Claims can be submitted for all drain construction/improvement work completed before February 15, 2018.
- A separate claim must be submitted for each drain construction/improvement project.
- Claims must be submitted on the applicable OMAFRA grant application form. To obtain a Microsoft Excel electronic copy of these forms, contact Becky Curran at 519-826-4049 or becky.curran@ontario.ca.

REQUIRED SUPPORTING DOCUMENTATION:

In accordance with ADIP Policy 2.8, supporting documentation must be provided for each drain construction/improvement grant claim. The supporting documentation includes:

- A copy of the final by-law authorizing the construction or improvement project. If this by-law has been provided to OMAFRA previously, an additional copy need not be sent. A provisionally adopted by-law is not acceptable.
- A copy of the engineer's report for the project. If, through the *Drainage Act* process, a copy of the report had previously been provided to the Ministry, another copy need not be sent.
- Copies of all decisions affecting the report (Court of Revision, Tribunal, Referee).
- Submission of an electronic copy of the drain plan, preferably in a data format that can be imported into the Land Information Ontario data warehouse.

<u>APPLICATION DEADLINE:</u> 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, February 15, 2018

- Grant applications for drain construction or improvement work, complete with all supporting documentation, must be received on or before Thursday, February 15, 2018 on the application forms provided by our Ministry.
- Faxed applications will no longer be accepted.
- If the deadline is missed or the application is incomplete, a grant application for the work will still be considered up to one year from the date of the completion of the project.

NOTES:

Consult with Ministry staff if you have any questions about the requirement for submitting the following types of grant applications:

- Preliminary reports
- Interim and/or final grant applications
- Adjustments (within one year of the completion of the project)

BY-LAW NO. 2018-09

By-law to Confirm the Proceedings of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 5(1) of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25 as amended, the powers of a municipality shall be exercised by its Council;

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 5(3) of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.0. 2001, c.25 as amended, a municipal power, including a municipality's capacity rights, powers and privileges under Section 8 of the Municipal Act, 2001, S.O. 2001, c.25 as amended, shall be exercised by By-law unless the municipality is specifically authorized to do otherwise;

WHEREAS it is deemed expedient that a By-law be passed to authorize the execution of agreements and other documents and that the Proceedings of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg at its meeting be confirmed and adopted by By-law; and,

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg hereby enacts as follows:

- 1. THAT the action(s) of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg in respect of all recommendations in reports and minutes of committees, all motions and resolutions and all actions passed and taken by the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg, documents and transactions entered into during the January 22nd, 2018, meeting of Council, are hereby adopted and confirmed, as if the same were expressly contained in this By-law;
- 2. THAT the Mayor and proper officials of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg are hereby authorized and directed to do all things necessary to give effect to the action(s) of the Council of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg during the said meetings referred to in paragraph 1 of this By-law;
- 3. THAT the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized and directed to execute all documents necessary to the action taken by this Council as described in Section 1 of this By-law and to affix the Corporate Seal of the Corporation of the Town of Amherstburg to all documents referred to in said paragraph 1.
