Addendum: Speaking notes of Greg Nemeth,

Mr. Mayor and members of council. Thank you for having me. Tonight I would like to present part of the preliminary process to possibly establish nature trails. Everyone should know the value and have an understanding what nature's ecosystems in Ontario are worth and whether nature communities deserve our undivided attention.

My name is Greg Nemeth. I am a ecosystem enthusiast. Photographing the Big Creek Wetland is my retirement hobby.

In 2009 the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources did a complete study of the Big Creek Watershed. The Big Creek is 2500 acres or 4 square miles, drains 18000 acres of farm land and is home to more species at risk of extinction in Essex County than anywhere else.

During the OMNR study of the Big Creek Watershed 562 different species were recorded

- -- The OMNR commented they rarely reach 500 species during a study
- --562 species were recorded because the Big Creek is a very diverse community—meaning many different types of vegetation attracting 47 families of birds of the 55 that make Canada home.
- --There were 259 species of faunal or animal recordings—159 different bird species which the OMNR commented again that 159 species of birds is remarkable. This is something seen during peak migration once thought only through Point Pelee National Park.
- --23 listed as Provincially rare, 14 animal species listed as species at risk, 3 endangered, 5 threatened
- --vegetation communities were over 100 recorded. Again it was emphasized as outstanding
- --Wetlands such as the Big Creek Wetlands are the most productive types of ecosystems globally. An abundance of many species is expected. Why is the Big Creek treated as though it is an ordinary pond?

The study was conducted from Lake Erie to Texas road.

Most diverse habitat was recorded at site 52 north of county road 16 which we no as Alma street. The OMNR study of site 52 includes restoration adjacent to agricultural lands to create a 240 metre buffer. The plan requires a site specific restoration plan if work is conducted according to the study.

The Big Creek has been declared a Significant Wetland. The Provincial Policy Statement requires significant wetland to be protected up to 120 metres or over 300 ft. on each side of the Big Creek.

- --72% of Ontario's wetlands have disappeared since the start of European settlement
- --Wetlands act as a sponge and clean our water before it enters lakes and rivers.
- --Do we want trails near the Big Creek? If we take care of its ecosystem eventually trails could be a possibility.

The Big Creek is an ecosystem paradise and yet it is also abused with ATV'S, clear-cut and mature black walnut trees were bulldozed over and left to rot. Where is the protection? Why aren't the boundaries of Significant Wetland protected and the land posted? People should know the importance of significant habitat. People know of the Big Creek Watershed. Most don't realize the value.

Butterflies are in decline. Every butterfly that resides in this region has been photographed near the Big Creek north of county road 16. The Giant Tiger Swallowtail and Monarch butterfly as well..

The single biggest reason, the reason wildlife is declining globally. We are destroying wildlife habitat. We are taking too much land. Valuable flora and fauna habitat. If we care at all about wildlife. If we want to leave anything for the next generations, land near the most productive types of ecosystems must stay vacant and natural. If we want wildlife trails we need wildlife.

Mowing vegetation near a wetland community is counter productive. When we are near obvious wildlife habitat we need to be thinking about biodiversity or how am I affecting or destroying flora and fauna unnecessarily. Thicket, marsh, swamp, fence rows, trees lines, woodlots and bush. Wildlife is utilizing every type of habitat and trying desperately to survive. Wildlife is losing the battle.

LAYING SIEGE to the LAST LINE OF DEFENCE

In November of 2013 a special report was sent to Dave Levac, who is speaker of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario. This 55 page report was sent by our Environmental Commissioner of Ontario, Gord Miller who reports directly to the Ontario Legislature. I will read two paragraphs so everyone can have somewhat of an understanding of the issues.

On June 30, 2008, Ontario's new Endangered Species Act, 2007 (ESA) came into force, replacing legislation from 1971 that was outdated and ineffective. The new ESA offered protection to an increased number of species and their habitats, as well as provided greater flexibility for implementation. In 2009, the Environmental Commissioner of Ontario (ECO) released a Special Report entitled The Last Line of Defence: A Review of Ontario's New Protections for Species at Risk. The ECO was supportive of the provincial government's new legislative framework for protecting species at risk, but raised numerous concerns surrounding the implementation of the ESA, especially the potential for misuse of the new Act's flexibility.

Over the past five years, the Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) has struggled to fully implement the ESA. In particular, MNR has delayed implementation of several of the Act's key measures. Rather than meet statutory deadlines, MNR has relied excessively on its discretionary power to delay the preparation of nearly half of all required recovery strategies for species at risk. This in turn has caused downstream delays of government response statements and habitat regulations for individual species. In addition, MNR has struggled to develop an efficient approvals process for issuing permits under the ESA in a timely manner, due in part to a lack of sufficient policy direction.

On July 1, 2013, a series of regulatory amendments came into force that created broad exemptions from the Act's requirements to obtain government permission prior to harming a species at risk and/or its habitat. The importance of these regulatory changes has prompted the ECO to present this Special Report to the Legislative Assembly.

Species around the world are facing an unprecedented threat of extinction from a variety of stressors. Habitat loss has been identified as the single greatest threat to species at risk, coupled with pollution, over-exploitation, disease, invasive species and climate change. Nearly one quarter of the world's mammals, one-third of the world's amphibian species and one in eight birds are considered globally threatened or extinct. In Ontario, 215 species or species populations are listed under the *Endangered Species Act*, 2007 (*ESA*) as endangered, threatened, special concern or extirpated, and the province has many more imperiled species that have not had the benefit of being assessed and listed under the Act.

This dramatic decline in biodiversity not only threatens the functioning of the ecosystems that we depend on for our air, water and food, but it also reduces the resilience of these ecosystems to environmental change. Protecting at-risk species is not just a matter of conserving biodiversity, it is also about preserving the important

personal connections that Ontarians have to our natural heritage, including the snapping turtles, monarch butterflies, bald eagles and woodland caribou that are part of our collective ecological community. The challenges we face in protecting and recovering species at risk are not insurmountable, but immediate, effective and sustained action is required.
